The following information was inadvertently left out of the staff report on page 3:

5. <u>Tree impacts.</u> The site contains 103 total trees of which 94 are considered high priority and 9 are considered significant as defined by the ordinance. As proposed, the project would impact 23 high priority trees (24%) which is less than the allowable removal limit of 32 high priority trees (35%). A total of 2 significant trees are proposed for removal (22%) which is less than the allowable removal limit of 4 significant trees (50%).

Sorry for the last minute addition, but we have been further discussing the proposed structure all morning and wanted to provide a few more details regarding the impact of the proposal on our lives as it may be the last opportunity to do so. The proposed building will be at the doorstep of our home with the 550-car ramp just 20-feet from our dining and living room windows and in our backyard. Where a hill of mature trees exists currently, a multilevel concrete ramp fit for an urban setting would take its place. We have recently retired, and unlike many of our friends who have homes in warmer climates, have chosen to live out our golden years in the home we have lived in and maintained for almost 20 years. We love living in Wayzata/Minnetonka and can't imagine moving at this point in our lives. But the thought of looking out our window each night during dinner to a multi-level parking ramp where nature once existed is hard to imagine. Should we have to leave our home, we'd be forced to sell our main financial asset at a steep discount given this project and attempt to find a new home fitting for seniors in the most difficult housing market in decades, with almost no supply. Hello.

We are writing to state our opposition to the Eagle Brook Church proposal for Wayzata Blvd in Minnetonka.

Although we are not residents, we live very close by on Crosby Road. The city of Wayzata directed us to use the same contact information as the residents of Minnetonka for communication purposes.

Increased Traffic/Safety Concerns

- It is reasonable to assume that our road will be used as an alternate route to get to the church.
- The road is already fairly busy and drivers frequently drive above the speed limit.
- We live in a neighborhood, not an industrial/retail area like the majority of Eagle Brook's current campuses.

Congestion

- Traffic can back up at the 3 way stop at the intersection of Crosby Road and Wayzata Blvd when there is an abnormal traffic flow into the area. We saw this during the 494 and County Road 101 construction projects. During peak hours, cars were backed up past our driveway trying to get through the intersection. I believe this is a possibility to happen frequently on the weekends with 550 cars flooding the area at a time to attend one of the four proposed church services.
- The intersection of Wayzata Blvd and County Road 101 is already very congested at peak times of the day. It can be very difficult to make a left hand turn at this intersection.

Additional Wear & Tear On Roads

- The current infrastructure will not be able to handle the increased traffic. Who would be responsible to pay for the needed upgrades?
- The current condition of the frontage road is fair to poor. A couple of years ago, there would often be standing water right by the boarder of Minnetonka and Wayzata. My husband spoke to someone at the city of Minnetonka about it and they said the project to fix the water issue was a "band aid" and that the road was in need of a major overhaul costing \$1M+.
- The church will not be paying taxes and I do not believe that the tax payers of Wayzata and Minnetonka should have to subsidize the cost of road improvements for a facility that is too large and does not fit this foresidential neighborhood.

Mr. Schaeppi:

I have been a resident near the proposed EBC church since 1992 – 30 years in April. I have many concerns if this mega church is built.

- 1. Wetland, wildlife and habitat eliminated or greatly reduced; many large white egrets and waterfowl call this area home.
- 2. Wishes of the original property owners, the Lauer family, and their vision and directive dismissed.
- 3. Two other churches currently sit on opposite sides of the proposed church. Think!
- 4. I encourage all of us to slow the build, repurpose buildings and re-envisioning existing spaces such as EBC has done with a former Menard's.
- 5. Concern for Fire Station 5 at Wayzata Boulevard and its ability to navigate intersection when an emergency arises which could be critical.

The modest frontage road and intersection at Linner Road and Wayzata Blvd will no doubt have difficulty handling the traffic after three church services let out. Heading west on the frontage road to access the freeway will not be much better either. I am very familiar with the traffic flow after observing it daily for three decades and traffic is always increasing due to new home development. My neighborhood is off Linner Road which feeds into the first intersection mentioned.

I urge the City Council to think hard about the lasting impact of this church and our surrounding neighborhood area. The construction period will be noisy, disruptive and hell for those eleven of my neighbors who live directly near the site. They did not expect this to happen! This area is nestled in a beautiful spot and a huge church like the one proposed needs a location like Wooddale and Grace churches in Eden Prairie – in open space. I support EBC wanting a facility to promote gathering but not here please!

Good Morning,

I listened to the Eagle Brook Church conversation last night. I recently purchased a house on Crosby Road and live in the city of Wayzata. However, many Wayzata residents will be impacted by the building of a megachurch on the Hillcrest lot. I hope that Minnetonka will reach out to hear Wayzata neighbor opinions as well as those of Minnetonka residents.

I know change comes and change will occur at the Hillcrest site. However, Eagle Brook church's concept of a megachurch is not a proposal I can support. The church talked about being neighborly on the call, but if you heard the neighbors, building a church of this size and having 500 cars driving in and out of such a location many times a day multiple days a week is not neighborly.

At the moment we live in a beautiful area. While there is traffic on Crosby it is easy for me to get in and out of my driveway at all times of day every day. I typically drive to Carlson Parkway to get on Highway 394.

If this megachurch campus goes through, there are going to be serious traffic problems and inconveniences for those of us who live here. There is no doubt church attendees would use Crosby road as a cut through. Have you thought about how the increased traffic will impact residents of Crosby Road?

What about the Frontage Road going down to 101? Construction on 101 finished a couple of years ago and it is already difficult to turn left from the Frontage Road onto 101 South as well as to turn left from 101 South onto the Frontage Road. Have you thought about the number of accidents that would occur at this intersection if say 300 of the church cars go this direction before and after each service?

Have you thought about the ease of fire trucks getting to emergencies before, during and after services?

Eagle Brook talked about police officers directing traffic at their site. None of us want to live in a neighborhood that has officers at the 101 intersection, at the church as well as at Carlson Parkway so 500 cars plus neighborhood traffic can move safely.

From what I heard last night, Eagle Brook Church does not have the current volume of people coming to their services to fill their proposed building. They do not know where the current attendees live and thus do not have data that this location and size would be necessary. The Hillcrest location is 15 minutes from their current location.

They have talked about evening services on Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday. Have you thought about how the evening services will impact those in the area? Both human and wildlife will be impacted by the increased night activity if the present church proposal goes through. Someone on the call spoke about emission pollution, what about the light pollution from this church campus?

I am not a direct neighbor to the site, but how do you compensate the families and people who live on the road going to Hillcrest? I don't believe eminent domain is necessary, but the road going to the proposed church would need to dramatically change either through taking neighboring properties or marshland to handle 500 cars at one time.

Have you thought about the two other churches along the Frontage Road?

I am not opposed to a commercial building being built at Hillcrest. I am opposed to the currently proposed Eagle Brook megachurch being built there. I hope you will listen to your community members who are concerned about how the size of the megachurch is problematic and will forever impact the area in negative ways from traffic to pollution to being a complete eyesore to its present neighbors.

I hope the City of Wayzata can be included in future conversations because Wayzata residents and Wayzata infrastructure are directly impacted by the Eagle Brook proposal.

Please contact me with any questions and I hope you will either encourage Eagle Brook to look elsewhere or dramatically decrease the size of their proposal.

- Our community has numerous, diverse worship facilities. There is no need for the facility.

Here is my updated letter.

I wanted to send over my thoughts on EBC's proposal and offer another suggestion based on the foundational guiding principles of the City of Minnetonka. Please know I was informed on Wednesday night 2/9 that I had until Thursday 2/10 at noon to send over any thoughts in order for my note to be included in the materials the City Council will review in the meeting next week. With that, my thoughts are as complete as they can be with limited time. I am also guessing that you will be receiving a limited amount of letters since I did not see the request for thoughts posted anywhere nor the timelines of when they need to be submitted.

I am opposed to large plan and structure that EBC is proposing. The roads and infrastructure will not be able to handle the amount of people EBC is expecting. EBC will not contribute to the economy of Minnetonka and will not be paying any taxes, but Minnetonka property owners will be responsible to pay for the usage of the roads. I am concerned about the large amounts of traffic, the light pollution, the disruption to the eco system on the property and the devaluation of my property (I have lived here for 22 years).

As I thought about the proposal, I asked myself, what benefit will the City of Minnetonka receive for this project? What is the guiding vision and mission for the City of Minnetonka as it relates to a large development of a organization on a large wet land property (in a smaller neighborhood) with large amount of concentrated traffic. I would ask that you ask yourself those questions and also I would ask that you read the Minnetonka's 2030 Comprehensive Guide Plan. Has this location been considered for a city park?

Here is what I found when I read through the documents:

Minnetonka's 2030 Comprehensive Guide Plan provides a policy framework to guide development, redevelopment and public services and programs through the year 2030. Although this current planning effort looks 20 years into the future, **the plan is intended to provide specific guidance for public decisions** over the next 10 years through policies, implementation strategies and programs. I would ask that you either print these documents off for review or review them virtually. The Minnetonka vision for the community is as follows:

Minnetonka... where quality is our nature

What will our community become? Minnetonka will be the community of choice where people come together to live, work and play in a naturally beautiful environment. As we work to preserve our quality neighborhoods and provide exceptional City services, we will always be aware of the delicate balance between the need for urban services and the importance of protecting and managing our natural surroundings.

If you decide to allow this large organization to proceed, I would ask that both the City Council and EBC work directly with the neighbors on a few items (*note the list is not exhaustive*):

- 2. Protection of the wetlands and the animals who live there
- 3. Seal off Clare Lane from Clarendon and creating a turnaround for those travelling on Clarendon so all houses are accessible by Clarendon Lane
- 4. Allowing all EBC traffic to only enter in through Clare
- 5. Aesthetically build and landscape the parking garage so it would not be visible (i.e. tall and bushy trees)
- 6. Explore other options to build entry roads on the current property
- 7. Restriction of any bright lights at night contribution to light pollution
- 8. Payment of 20% of Clare and Clarendon property values to each of the neighbors as the overall property values will be devalued immediately
 - 1. Many residents have invested money into their homes to increase the value, but that investment might no longer be returned to them
 - 2. Some residents paid more than the fair value of the property due to the location and surroundings, but that may now be changing
- 9. Continued discussions with neighbors on other items to lessen the negative impacts that a large structure with a 550 stall parking facility
- 10. Traffic control to extend into the entrances to Hwy 394
- 11. No construction traffic on Clarendon (only allowing Clare to be used)
- 12. No church parking on residential streets or will be towed (with residents given multiple permits to park for the guests to their home)
- 13. No outdoor concerts or loud outdoor events
- 14. A detailed understanding and alignment of events and uses of the property outside of a gathering place for worship

Coming out of the Zoom meeting held on Tuesday 2/8, EBC's leadership shared that they want to hear from the neighbors and value our thoughts. I hope that to be true.

I would like every council member and others who will be voting on this proposal to put themselves and their family in this scenario.......

Imagine that you live next to or on Clare or Clarendon (small and narrow residential street). You purchased this home because of the location and the neighborhood along with the wildlife. You find out that a large mega church with multiple services which could draw up to 1000 cars per day with 2 services wants to build on a property on Clare Lane. This has so many implications which include which you know:

1. The narrow horseshoe street can not handle this amount of traffic

- 2. There are no turn lanes on the street
- 3. Clarendon is a blind spot while turning out on to the frontage road so many of the residents use Clare instead of Clarendon
- 4. There are already 2 other churches that leverage side street parking on weekends which makes the streets even more narrow
- 5. During certain times of the day, medical, police and fire will not be able to get through
- 6. The wildlife will be disrupted including the geese, turkeys and turtles who cross Clare to get to the other side
- 7. There is no sidewalks for individuals to be out walking their streets or riding their bikes at this time
- 8. You will need to wait to pull out of your own driveway at various times
- 9. You know that during the winter months when Clarendon is icy, it is nearly impossible for cars to drive up the hill, so all traffic goes out through Clare
- 10. Entrances to and from the frontage road will be backed up
- 11. During certain weekends Christmas, Easter and kick off weekend, cars will be using the street parking in front of your house because there is not enough room in the parking ramp and you will not have any places for your family and guests to park for the celebrations at your house
- 12. Cars will idle and exhaust will pollute the area
- 13. Your property value will decrease immediately. Your property value is around \$475,000 and it drops between \$50,000 \$100,000 because of the additional traffic and busyness that was not there when you purchased it. Why would someone purchase it at fair market value if they can purchase a similar home in a less busy location for the same amount? You will need to discount the sale of your home.

I am not opposed to expanding the word of God. I sent all three of my kids to a Christian school (K-8th grade), I regularly attend church and I am in a bible study. I am opposed to the LOCATION of this project. There are other locations that have the infrastructure within the roads (sidewalks, stop lights, multiple entrances, turn lanes) that can handle the amount of traffic that is expected. Based on what I am aware of, there are no other EBC locations with this limited of road conditions and there are no other EBC locations with this many direct driveways on the actual route into the church as Clarendon and Clare.

Based on the guiding principles that were created and established for the city, an EBC campus does not align with the direction, mission and vision of the City of Minnetonka. If the City of Minnetonka is looking to develop the land, a park that all Minnetonka residents can enjoy is a great option.

Hi Brad

I am a mostly retired commercial real estate lawyer. I was the General Counsel of the Carlson family real estate company for 10 years and a partner at a downtown law firm for another 11. Alex and Bridget are close friends with my son Andy and we have known Alex and Bridget for 10+ years. Here are my issues with the proposed development:

- 1. Very bad form on the part of the developer not to organize a neighborhood meeting to discuss the project and interact personally. We did this on every development we did. Worst thing for neighbors is the unknown. We actually floated large balloons to illustrate how high Two Carlson Parkway was going to be so the neighbors could stop worrying about office dwellers peaking into their homes at night. We also showed them the kind of parking lot lights we were going to use and had one functional.
- 2. This is a lot of development on a tight space. Seems to me that this fits better on a larger site that is not hamstrung by large wetlands and a lot of residential housing. Grace Church in Eden Prairie would be a good property to visit. That is the kind of site this project needs.
- 3. Very confident that traffic will be an issue. Perhaps even parking if that 1200 seat auditorium is allowed.
- 4. Light sweep from cars above grade trying to access and leave the parking area will be an issue. There are a lot of families and older people in that neighborhood that won't appreciate that. Also, lighting will be required for the site and the parking deck. Again, having a lot of the parking lighting be above grade on a second level will certainly intrude on the privacy of the neighbors.
- 5. Where is all the runoff going to go? Seems like a project this big will need ponding. Is the plan to encroach into the wetland? That is never a good idea in these infill sites. Things are working well now and upsetting that runoff pattern could lead to water

intrusion issues for the neighbors or over fill of the wetlands.

My suggestion would be the following:

- A. Reduce the footprint of the building and eliminate the 1200 seat auditorium. There is no room for that kind of facility on that site.
- B. By reducing the size as proposed in A above, there should be no need for a two level parking deck. If there is a proof of parking issue, then the City should have the applicant look at a level of underground parking.
- C. I would start with how many surface parking stalls can fit onto the property and then build around that number with the size of the building. Clearly the issue for this large of a facility is parking.
- D. Seems to me that this project would require an Environmental Assessment Worksheet. The Planning Commission should be asking for that. There are enough issues to require this (traffic, wetlands, runoff, etc.)
- E. There should be some plan for screening the site. This is the kind of thing a good developer would be discussing with the neighbors BEFORE they hit the Planning Commission. It is amazing what a good natural screening plan will do to help the neighbors get on board.

Those are my thoughts based on 25 years of getting beaten up on the developer end of projects. David Weigman



- 1. Wetland, wildlife and habitat eliminated or greatly reduced; many large white egrets and waterfowl call this area home.
- 2. Wishes of the original property owners, the Lauer family, and their vision and directive dismissed.

Good Morning,

I listened to the Eagle Brook Church conversation last night. I recently purchased a house on Crosby Road and live in the city of Wayzata. However, many Wayzata residents will be impacted by the building of a megachurch on the Hillcrest lot. I hope that Minnetonka will reach out to hear Wayzata neighbor opinions as well as those of Minnetonka residents.

I know change comes and change will occur at the Hillcrest site. However, Eagle Brook church's concept of a megachurch is not a proposal I can support. The church talked about being neighborly on the call, but if you heard the neighbors, building a church of this size and having 500 cars driving in and out of such a location many times a day multiple days a week is not neighborly.

At the moment we live in a beautiful area. While there is traffic on Crosby it is easy for me to get in and out of my driveway at all times of day every day. I typically drive to Carlson Parkway to get on Highway 394.

If this megachurch campus goes through, there are going to be serious traffic problems and inconveniences for those of us who live here. There is no doubt church attendees would use Crosby road as a cut through. Have you thought about how the increased traffic will impact residents of Crosby Road?

What about the Frontage Road going down to 101? Construction on 101 finished a couple of years ago and it is already difficult to turn left from the Frontage Road onto 101 South as well as to turn left from 101 South onto the Frontage Road. Have you thought about the number of accidents that would occur at this intersection if say 300 of the church cars go this direction before and after each service?

Have you thought about the ease of fire trucks getting to emergencies before, during and after services?

Eagle Brook talked about police officers directing traffic at their site. None of us want to live in a neighborhood that has officers at the 101 intersection, at the church as well as at Carlson Parkway so 500 cars plus neighborhood traffic can move safely.

From what I heard last night, Eagle Brook Church does not have the current volume of people coming to their services to fill their proposed building. They do not know where the current attendees live and thus do not have data that this location and size would be necessary. The Hillcrest location is 15 minutes from their current location.

They have talked about evening services on Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday. Have you thought about how the evening services will impact those in the area? Both human and wildlife will be impacted by the increased night activity if the present church proposal goes through. Someone on the call spoke about emission pollution, what about the light pollution from this church campus?

I am not a direct neighbor to the site, but how do you compensate the families and people who live on the road going to Hillcrest? I don't believe eminent domain is necessary, but the road going to the proposed church would need to dramatically change either through taking neighboring properties or marshland to handle 500 cars at one time.

Have you thought about the two other churches along the Frontage Road?

I am not opposed to a commercial building being built at Hillcrest. I am opposed to the currently proposed Eagle Brook megachurch being built there. I hope you will listen to your community members who are concerned about how the size of the megachurch is problematic and will forever impact the area in negative ways from traffic to pollution to being a complete eyesore to its present neighbors.

I hope the City of Wayzata can be included in future conversations because Wayzata residents and Wayzata infrastructure are directly impacted by the Eagle Brook proposal.

Please contact me with any questions and I hope you will either encourage Eagle Brook to look elsewhere or dramatically decrease the size of their proposal.

Hello Minnetonka City Officials,

My name is Jonathan Coots and I live at 19398 Lupine Lane, Corcoran, MN 55340. I have seen a couple of recent articles for the concept plan to build an Eagle Brook Church location in your city (15409 Wayzata Blvd). In 2020, my neighborhood and I faced an identical situation with Eagle Brook (EBC) that I believe is relevant to the current decision that is facing your Planning Commission and City Council. EBC pursued a large size facility with a 1500 seat auditorium and 848 parking spots (no parking garage).

Prior to the Planning Commission meeting, EBC only engaged the city

with officials and ignored residents, even when residents reached out. A couple of my neighbors attempted to set up a meeting with them and were ignored. They had similar concerns to what the Minnetonka neighbors do today - size, scope, parking, and traffic in a low-density residential neighborhood.

My neighborhood banded together and organized and was able to show our elected officials that EBC should not be put adjacent to a residential neighborhood. This process was a catalyst for massive local engagement in city government, leading to our city council having a large shake up with 2 new council members and new mayor as a result of dissatisfaction with the previous leadership. It also prompted significant updates to local ordinances and standards to better anticipate and mitigate the impacts of large assembly uses in residential zones. Seeing this exact same scenario play out again in Minnetonka, when there are so many large open parcels available where they could be a good neighbor, really makes it hard for me to watch from the sidelines and is why I am writing to you.

My neighbors and I did substantial research on their proposed build, presented a treasure trove of data to the city for review, and ultimately the data showed that shoe horning this 2-acre industrial building and 10-acre parking lot into the NW corner of 101 and county road 47 was not workable. I would HIGHLY encourage you to reach out to current Corcoran City Officials to learn more information about how the city made its decisions as well as the research residents made to be heard and ultimately run for office.

- Mayor Tom McKee and City council members were both residents who lived in the neighborhood impacted by EBC's proposed structure.
 Dean Vehrenkamp was a member of the Planning Commission when it unanimously voted no to having EBC build in the proposed location.
 Alan Schultz and Jonathan Bottema were 2 current City Council members who voted no on the proposed structure.
- Please note that EBC chose to go to the City Council for a
 vote despite the fact the Planning Commission had
 unanimously voted no. Their refusal to make substantive
 changes or to find a more suitable, alternative location led to
 massive amounts of time being spent by city staff, elected
 officials, and the residents of my neighborhood.

The community opposition, ultimately including the city itself, was

consistently clear in its communication: it wasn't that EBC wasn't a good fit for Corcoran, it's that that the facility in that specific location had issues, and there were other parcels of land that would have worked for them, including one that was adjacent to the City Hall building with ample space and almost every concern voiced by the community mitigated...no alternative options were every seriously considered or genuinely pursued by EBC, even after the original proposal was denied.

Many concerns that were raised directly with EBC fell upon deaf ears and "promises" they made were empty as they would walk them back quickly after making them. I raised a very specific concern regarding parking. They had proposed 848 parking spots that would support their 1,500-person auditorium, yet the data provided by EBC indicated that 1 parking spot was needed for every 1.5 attendees, a deficit of 152 parking spots. When presented with this information they walked back their data, stated it was incorrect, and yet could not provide clarity on what was the correct formula for the data they had collected from other EBC sites.

The proposed site in Minnetonka will have 550 parking spots, if using their previously presented math of 1.5 attendees per parking spot then they will need 800 parking spots...this means they knowingly anticipate that up to 250 cars could overflow from their parking garage... and will park where, exactly?

A comment that I heard over and over was that the services they host are not during prime drive time so the traffic impact was negligible. While services are not during rush hour, they are held during "prime family time." This is how to correctly view a proposed industrial building and the massive traffic flows it will cause in a low-density residential neighborhood. The surrounding neighborhood will become a parking lot on the weekend and likely ensure that the impacted homeowners will need to move to ensure the safety of their families.

EBC does hire local PD to direct traffic but those officers are only at the entrance/exit of their property and can't patrol the adjacent neighborhoods at the same time. They cannot control the path traffic takes to reach the site. This was one element in Corcoran- the hired police officers would not be able to prevent heavy traffic on local streets in any way.

A colleague I have that lives near one of the existing EBC sites and attends services there told me that the sheer number of vehicles make it impossible for them to leave or return to their home during the time prior to, during, after service times. Effectively, residents are blockaded in or out of their homes during a rather large portion of every weekend. This fundamentally alters the way with which they enjoy their property. This

is one of countless issues that were raised in Corcoran. EBC simply moving south a few miles (attempting to build their facility in the exact same type of neighborhood) does not make these issues, concerns, and constraints disappear.

I sincerely understand the balancing that is needed when using a critical eye to evaluate proposed land uses when a house of worship is involved but that should only ensure that you are treating them fairly and equally to other possible uses. If a Walmart, Best Buy, Target, or other building of similar size were proposed, any Planning Commission or City Council would rigorously evaluate that proposal, the value to the community, and the substantial impact on the surrounding community and neighborhood. This land use is no different from those, this is an industrial building with a parking ramp wedged into a quiet neighborhood that has drastic implications for the surrounding property owners' ability to enjoy their homes.

I greatly appreciate the fact that you have a concept plan review in place so that all parties are able to make good, well informed, decisions without investing a lot of time and energy. As someone who has been in the same shoes your concerned residents are, I humbly suggest the following prior to any decisions, preapprovals, or statements of acceptance regarding this land use:

- 1. Speak directly with the Corcoran City Council members to gain firsthand information from their experience in an identical situation.
- 2. Review the substantial amount of information that was provided by EBC and Corcoran area residents for their proposed building at 101 and Hackamore: availability of this information is available in the city council agenda packets and could be requested via email to the Corcoran City Administrator.
- 3. Require the appropriate environmental impact studies be performed before any level of approval is provided considering the sheer size of the combined structures with impermeable ground.
- 4. Insist that previous and new traffic study data be collected from all current EBC locations and require it be submitted for review and analysis by an independent third party.

I am formally requesting that this email be made available to the Minnetonka Planning Commission for their review prior to the first concept planning meeting on Thursday, February 17th, 2022 and to the City Council prior to their meeting on Monday February 28th, 2022.

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My neighborhood banded together and organized and was able to show our elected officials that EBC should not be put adjacent to a residential neighborhood.
