Just Deeds helps families remove racially restrictive covenants

Redressing historic racism is a step toward becoming more inclusive

In 2021, Ivan and Diane Arenson learned about the city's involvement with Just Deeds, a program that helps homeowners remove racially restrictive covenants from their property deed. They were surprised to discover their home had such a covenant.

Racial covenants are agreements written into property deeds preventing the sale or residency to people of color.

Removing the racial covenant was an easy decision for the Arenson family. "This [was] one little way we can make the world better," said Diane Arenson.



The process was quick and easy. City staff helped the Arensons get in touch with a lawyer who made changes to the deed, all free of charge. Then, Ivan and Diane simply brought the paperwork to City Hall. "It really couldn't have been easier," said Ivan Arenson. "I think in total, it may have taken 30-45 minutes of our time."

Although racially restricted covenants are not enforceable by law, removing these restrictions can still have a positive effect in Minnetonka. "One of the things that we've learned is that laws and rules can change," Ivan said. "Now we've removed a potential barrier to someone living their life in a just manner forever. It's not only a small action today, but it may be an important barrier to prevent injustice in the future."

Market Bucks match SNAP-EBT spending dollar-for-dollar (up to \$10). There are four easy steps to use SNAP-EBT at the farmers market:

- 1. Go to the Farmers Market Info Booth
- **2.** Swipe your EBT card for the amount you want to spend. We'll match your purchase dollar-for-dollar, up to \$10.
- **3.** Get \$10 in Market Bucks and \$10 in Produce Market Bucks each visit. You do not have to spend the full \$10 each time.
- **4.** Shop for up to \$30 of SNAP-eligible food and produce at the farmers market.



The Minnetonka Farmers Market is a participating market in the state's WIC Farmers Market Nutrition Program.

- WIC participants receive \$30 in checks to use on produce at the farmers market.
- Participating produce vendors accept the checks at our market.



"POP" (Power of Produce) Club for kids

The POP Club is a free program for kids, ages 4-17, sponsored by South Lake Pediatrics.

- Sign up with a parent or guardian at the Farmers Market Info Booth.
- Receive a reusable produce shopping bag and flower seeds when you sign up.
- Check in each week to receive a \$2
 voucher to spend on produce a fruit,
 vegetable or herb of your choice. Vouchers
 can be saved or used each day.

Meet Community Engagement Officer Bauer

Minnetonka Police Officer Peter Bauer is all about connecting with the community. He recently accepted the role as Minnetonka's community engagement officer - a position created five years ago to better engage residents and build relationships within the Minnetonka community.

"There's so much to community policing," Bauer said. "My role is about being able to build that trust and communication, create comfortability with the Minnetonka PD and the community."



Bauer joined the Minnetonka Police Department in 2014 and has served as a patrol officer, field training officer and mental health evaluation team member. His most recent assignment was

two years on the department's traffic unit.

With the ongoing pandemic, outreach has been challenging for the police department.

But as events return, Bauer is looking for ways to reintroduce the department, get involved and better reach pockets of the community that may not have regular positive interactions with police.



He also plans to build on the relationships developed within Minnetonka's faith community and continue tutoring elementary students twice a week - a program he started while on the traffic unit.

"It's rewarding to go into elementary schools in uniform and build that familiarity with our younger kids," he said.




"He improves service quality by seldom missing a training night, or by signing up for additional trainings when they are available," said Chief John Vance, shown next to Alme in the photo.



Clearing the air on recreational fires

Every summer brings with it evenings spent around a campfire and an increase in complaints about smoke from those fires. Minnetonka requires permits for all wood-burning recreational fires. Permits are available at **minnetonkamn.gov/fire** and should be renewed each year.

When preparing a recreational fire, please be considerate of neighbors who may suffer from respiratory illnesses. Also keep in mind that recently downed branches and limbs - known as green wood - do not burn well and can be particularly smoky. Please deliver storm debris to the city's brush disposal site.



Recreational fire recommendations:

- Wind speeds should be at or below 10 miles per hour
- The air quality index should be at or below 100 according
- The DNR fire danger rating should be low or moderate

City gardens are in full bloom

Each summer, the Minnetonka Civic Center campus is in full bloom with pretty petuninas, colorful coleus and flamboyant cannas.

The magnificent flower beds are the work of the Public Works Department's Eileen Connors and her green thumb.



"I love flowers. I love the colors after the gray of winter," she said. "I just like watching something become beautiful."

Connors is the flower guru at the city, responsible for the landscaping and flowers beds at Glen Lake Station, Minnetonka Mills Park, Burwell House and the civic center

campus. Her plant knowledge and ability to grow vibrant greenery keep Minnetonka's public spaces in full bloom.

Each January, Connors thoughtfully selects the next season's plants by comparing the list of available plants from her vendors with notes from past years. She takes photos throughout the season to track the plantings' progress and tries to do something new each year.

"Different plants shine at different times of the year," Connors said. "There are a lot of variables that go into selecting our plants."

Volunteer Spotlight: Richard Koenig

Come summer, you're sure to find Minnetonka resident Richard Koenig with a hose in hand watering the flower beds at the Mills Gazebo and The Landing Shop.

Koenig spends three hours, two to three times a week, manually watering the large plots. Each spring, he also helps plant the beautiful flower beds throughout the city.

"He's my partner with the planting," said Public Works' Eileen Connors.
"He shows up at seven in the morning

and stays through the whole day. He's the Energizer Bunny."

A founding member and ongoing volunteer with the Senior Garden Club, Koenig isn't one for accolades. "I would rather just help out when there is something that will make our community be a better place to live."

The plants - thousands of annuals and perennials - arrive the third week of May and there's a short window to get them in the ground.

Connors' team waters, fertilizes, weeds, pinches and checks the annual plants' health until the first frost of the season. Institution Community Work Crews (ICWC) maintain the city's perennial beds on the civic center campus and parks.

It's hard work, but the reward comes in the multitude of compliments and positive feedback the city receives each year. "Minnetonka doesn't have the main street with hanging baskets that many communities have. So this," she said, gesturing to the flowers outside city hall, "is our city square."



Minnetonka Senior Services Garden Club members recently helped plant more than 60 large planters to be displayed at city parks and public spaces. The seniors volunteer each year to assist with the annual planting.

Minnetonka protects pollinators

Most flowering plants on Earth need the help of animal pollinators to reproduce. Unfortunately, pollinator species - from wild bees, butterflies and moths to wasps, flies, beetles and hummingbirds - are declining globally due to pressure from habitat loss, chemical overuse and climate change. They need our help.



In 2017, the City of Minnetonka answered the call by signing the Mayors' Monarch Pledge, a National Wildlife Federation program that provides a framework to guide cities in pollinator protection efforts. Every year, the city re-commits to this program at the highest level, with:

- Extensive public outreach and engagement
- Collaboration between city departments and with external partners
- Ongoing habitat restoration on city properties
- Education and technical assistance to help residents add resilient habitat where they live and work
- An updated ordinance to increase and preserve habitat on private property.
