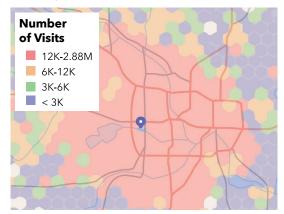

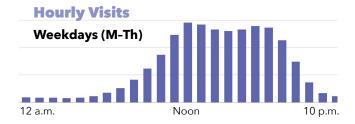

This heat map shows the home locations of area visitors.





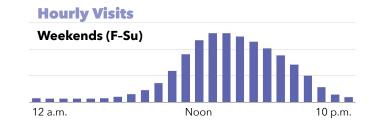
Destination Ridgedale

The Ridgedale area of Minnetonka is a dynamic place and an impactful driver of the local economy. Over the last several years, the area has seen new housing development, new retail and restaurant establishments and the current construction of the city's newest park. The city recognizes the importance of the Ridgedale area to the local economy.

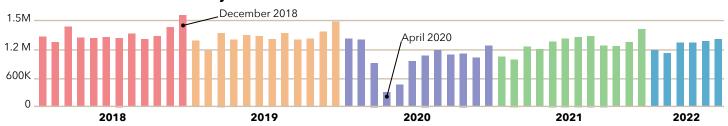
But like many retail and mixed-use areas, Ridgedale was impacted by COVID-19. To better understand how the area was affected, the city worked with a consultant to study who visits the Ridgedale area, where they come from, where they are going and additional basic characteristics.

Using anonymous data, the city has a better picture of Ridgedale as a destination and how it rebounded from the COVID pandemic. Q: We understand Elevate Business has supported more than 900 entrepreneurs. Can you tell us more about one of those experiences?

Ice Dreamzzz, a Thai-style rolled ice cream shop in Plymouth, was able to gain business planning support, which led them to successfully finance and open their business. We also helped Cheesecake Funk, a Minnetonka-based business, develop a comprehensive business growth strategy.

Q: What has the COVID-19 pandemic taught you about business planning?

The pandemic brought to light many obstacles entrepreneurs face on a daily basis. Although we all lead with a business passion, the main lesson learned was that having a solid business plan that is inclusive of your business operations, marketing, financial management, compliance requirements and succession planning is the key to your sustainability, economic growth and building generational wealth.

Q: Tashie, what's the best piece of advice you have for aspiring business owners?

My best advice is to crawl before you walk. Take the time to meet with a business professional to develop a plan to reach your goal. Make sure that you have a full understanding of what it takes to be successful in the business that you are passionate about.

Loans available to help businesses meet code requirements

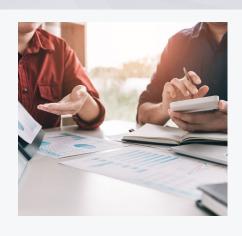
New fund assists with commercial code compliance

In October, the Minnetonka City Council approved the creation of a loan fund to help businesses address required code corrections, safety improvements and other areas of concern identified by city officials.

Eligible businesses must be:

- Located within Minnetonka or in the process of securing a location in the city
- Locally owned and operated
- For-profit
- In compliance with city ordinances, codes (or addressing codes) licensing and any other regulations with the city.

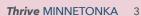
