## What is the Joint Community Police Partnership (JCPP)?

The JCPP is a Hennepin County program that works collaboratively to enhance relationships between police and the community, specifically with immigrants, people of color, indigenous people, and faith communities.

## What do we do?

- Meet regularly with police personnel to address community concerns.
- Organize community forums and workshops.
- Develop and organize community engagement initiatives, some with a focus on youth.
- Organize and facilitate training for police and community.
- Partner with various community organizations.
- Meet with community members to listen, learn, and build relationships.
- Act as a bridge between community and police.

## How can you get involved?

- Apply to serve as a member on the Multicultural Advisory Committee (MAC).
- Coordinate or volunteer for community programs.
- Build community/police relationships and work with the community liaison to host a community meeting and/or Q&A session with police officers.
- Share your experiences and ideas. Meet with the community liaison or a MAC member.
- Connect us with your neighbors, friends, family and other people you know. We continuously seek to connect with our local community.
