Voting will take place Tuesday, Nov. 7 from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Voters in line by 8 p.m. will be allowed to vote.

ere are 23 precincts in Minnetonka, each with a designated polling location. Voters must vote in the precinct where they live. Polling locations can be found at mnvotes.org, or call city hall at 952-939-8200.

Please note, three of the city's polling places have changed location and one has a new name:

• Ward 1 Precinct D

Voters who previously voted at Grace Apostolic Church will now vote at Destiny Hill Church (13207 Lake St.).

• Ward 2 Precinct D

City council sets 2018 property tax levy limit

ach September, in accordance with Minnesota state law, the Minnetonka City Council is required to set a maximum preliminary tax levy before approving the following year's budget.

At its meeting Monday, Sept. 25, the city council adopted a preliminary property tax increase of no more than 3.6 percent for the 2018 budget.

What does this mean for the average homeowner?

City property taxes for the median valued home in Minnetonka (\$332,800 in 2017) will increase by approximately \$4* next year.

How does the 2018 budget dier from the current budget?

e proposed 2018 budget will allow the city to continue to deliver high quality services to Minnetonka residents. e budget reflects a reduction in some areas, but it will also make it possible to address new initiatives and needs:

• **Park and trail planning**: In an e ort to improve connectivity of the city's trail system, a request expressed by many in the Imagine Minnetonka community engagement process, a new position will manage research, plan development, grant writing and public education campaigns for trails and parks.



- **Technology support**: Growing and more complex information technology needs will result in the hiring of an IT sta member.
- **Public data compliance**: e city's e ciency in fulfilling legally mandated public information and data requests a demand that has grown exponentially in recent years will improve with the hiring of a records specialist.
- **Finance administration**: A new financial analyst will coordinate administration of the city's capital program, which has grown substantially in both cost and complexity in the last decade.

Minnetonka to transition 911 dispatch operations to Hennepin County

Collowing an independent study and a series of follow-up discussions, Hennepin County will become the city of Minnetonka's 911 public safety dispatch provider in mid-December.

e Hennepin County Board approved the addition of Minnetonka to the Sherri 's O ce dispatch services at a Sept. 26 meeting.

"Our current dispatch operations have served Minnetonka extremely well," said Minnetonka Police Chief Scott Boerboom. "However, the need for updated technology and increased service demands have led us to consider other options. Transitioning dispatch operations to the county will allow residents to benefit from significant cost savings without comprising the exceptional customer service always provided."

e study conducted earlier this year identified three challenges that would hamper the city's ability to provide exceptional service into the future: expanding stanglevels, resource depth and long-term cost. Scenarios to address these challenges were explored, and ultimately, collaborating with the Hennepin County Sherri's Oce emerged as the best overall option. e Minnetonka City Council formally voted to request the county to assume dispatch services at its Aug. 28 meeting.

About Hennepin County Dispatch

Hennepin County currently provides dispatch services for 37 other communities, including 24 law enforcement agencies, 23 fire departments and four emergency medical service providers. e facility handles more than 600,000 calls per year, with an average of one emergency call every two minutes. Plymouth, Maple Grove and Brooklyn Park are among the cities that utilize Hennepin County dispatch services. Hennepin County will not charge the City of Minnetonka to provide 911 dispatch services.



Help conserve water this winter

In the summer, water conservation focuses on big outdoor uses — watering lawns, filling swimming pools, washing cars and more. When the calendar flips to winter, there are still plenty of ways to conserve water in the home. ese minor suggestions go a long way toward water conservation:

- Take shorter showers
- Switch to low-flow showerheads and toilets
- Turn o the faucet while brushing teeth
- Fix leaky faucets

Beyond water use in the home, many common household purchases require a lot of water in manufacturing or agriculture before they ever reach consumers. Here are some common items and the amount of water needed to produce them, according to *National Geographic*:

Item	Water required for production
One pound of beef	1,799 gallons
500 sheets of paper	1,321 gallons
Cotton for one T-shirt	713 gallons
One pound of soybeans	216 gallons

Right-of-way tree pruning begins later this month

In November, the city will begin pruning trees along the right-of-way (ROW) to improve sightlines and ensure safe streets, and to prepare for 2018 street construction projects. Crews will continue to prune ROW trees through March 2018.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ABOUT TREE PRUNING

Why prune during the winter?

Winter is the best time to prune because trees – along with potentially harmful insects and diseases – are dormant. Winter pruning also promotes healthy regrowth in spring.

Who performs the work, and what does it entail?

e city or a contractor prunes ROW trees at no cost to property owners. Goals are:

- Raise tree canopies 18-to-20 feet above the road to avoid damage by the 17-foot-tall mill machine used in road construction.
- Create a safe work zone for street construction crews and equipment.
- Remove dead or broken branches that may become a future hazard.
- Remove shrubs or small trees that block sightlines or signs at intersections.

How does the city determine to remove a tree in advance of a road project?

ROW trees must be removed if they are a street hazard. Trees also may be removed if they can't be properly pruned to allow for safe passage of construction equipment.

How can ROW tree conflicts be avoided?

- Plant evergreen trees (pine, spruce, etc.) more than 20 feet from the street.
- Plant deciduous trees (those that drop leaves in the fall) at least 15 feet from the street.
- Don't plant anything within six feet of the street.
- On corner lots, ensure that intersection signs and sightlines are clear and visible.

Prepare now for emerald ash borer

Emerald ash borer (EAB) is a destructive, non-native beetle that feeds on and kills the living tissue of ash trees. EAB has not yet been identified in Minnetonka, but it moves closer every year. After discovering EAB in Plymouth in 2016, it was found in Eden Prairie this spring, near Minnetonka's southeast border.

Minnesota has the nation's largest population of ash trees, numbering almost one billion, and all untreated ash trees will be at-risk when EAB makes its way into Minnetonka. EAB will infest and kill 99 percent of untreated trees, resulting in dead, brittle trees that will create a hazard to roads and buildings.



How to help

To reduce EAB's impact in Minnetonka, homeowners are encouraged to treat healthy ash trees (at least 10 inches in diameter). e city has a bulk discount for EAB treatments with Rainbow Treecare (952-767-6920), or homeowners can contact their preferred company for information about treatment.


