# City council special election set for Tuesday, Feb. 14

A special election to fill the vacant Minnetonka City Council Member, At Large Seat B, is set for Tuesday, February 14.

e seat became vacant when former Council Member Amber Greves resigned the position in December.

### **Absentee voting**

Absentee voting will be available if you cannot get to the polling place on Election Day due to absence from the precinct, illness or disability, religious observance, or service as an election judge in another precinct.

### How do I vote absentee?

Absentee voting for the special election begins Friday, January 13, and continues through Monday, February 13.

Voters may vote in person at Minnetonka City Hall, 14600 Minnetonka Boulevard, Minnetonka, during regular business hours, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Extended absentee voting hours are available Saturday, February 11, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.; and Monday, February 13, until 5 p.m.

Voters may also absentee vote by mail by requesting an absentee ballot application

at (952) 939-8200. Applications may also be downloaded from the election section at *www.eminnetonka.com*. Upon receipt of your completed application, a ballot will be mailed to you. Remember, the voted ballot must be received at city hall by Election Day for the vote to count.

### Special election is Feb. 14

Polling places will open at 7 a.m. Tuesday, February 14, and remain open until 8 p.m. If you are in line at 8 p.m., you will be allowed to vote.

### **Polling locations**

All voters will vote at their regular polling location, however, some of the room locations may have changed. Please follow signs at your polling place, and check the website at *www. eminnetonka.com* for current room updates. If you vote at the Lindbergh Center, consider voting during the day, as a Hopkins High School basketball game is scheduled for the evening.

To nd your speci c polling place, visit the elections page on the city's website at **www.eminnetonka.com**.

Voters may only vote in person at their assigned polling place. Be sure to know your correct polling place — it will save you time.

# **Registering to vote**

Minnesota allows voters to register to vote

at the polls on Election Day. You will need to register if you have never registered to vote, if you have changed your name or address (including just moving to another



apartment in the same building) since you last voted, or if you have not voted in four years.

Minnesota state law requires specied forms of identication to register at the polling place. For more information about these forms, see the city's website at www.eminnetonka.com.

# Minnetonka's new recycling program starts January 1

By now, every Minnetonka household has received a new wheeled, lidded recycling cart in preparation for the arrival of single-sort recycling. You should also have received a mailing from Allied Waste explaining the new program and showing your 2012 collection dates.

Still have questions? Read on for more information.

### When will my recycling be picked up?

Your recycling pickup day doesn't change, but pickup will take place every two weeks instead of every week. Recycling should be out by 6:30 a.m. on your pickup day. Be sure to place your new recycling cart and your garbage can on opposite sides of your driveway — at least three feet apart from each other and any other objects. is

ensures carts aren't mixed up by the haulers and also makes it easier for the truck arms to retrieve and empty the carts. For a map of recycling collection areas and the 2012 collection dates for each area, visit www. eminnetonka.com. You can also nd the map and January collection dates on page 7.

# How can I request a larger or smaller recycling cart?

You may request a larger cart or smaller recycling cart as soon as you determine you need it by calling **Allied Waste at (952) 941-5174.** 

# What do I do if my recycling cart won't tinside my garage?

Some people choose to keep recycling and garbage containers outside because of limited garage space. Remember, city ordinances require all trash and recycling bins to be stored out of public view, either inside a garage or behind a screened enclosure, except for the evening before and the day of trash and/or recycling collection.

# What can I recycle?

Each cart contains a list of acceptable and unacceptable items imprinted in the lid for easy reference. e new recycling contract allows more items to be recycled, including plastic bags from retailers, foil-lined containers (juice boxes) and all types of plastic food and beverage containers (#1 – #7), including yogurt cups and butter/whip cream tubs. Wax-coated cardboard (which typically holds frozen items) still cannot be recycled — but plastic coated items such as milk cartons, juice boxes and cartons of soup/broth are recyclable.

# Flashpoints From the Minnetonka Fire Department

n firefighting lingo, a flashpoint is the temperature at which combustible materials can burst into ame. ashpoints in this quarterly feature, however, are not so volatile—rather, they are the initiatives and events that serve as the catalyst for the excellent service provided every day by the Minnetonka Fire Department to city residents and businesses. For more information about any of these items, call the re department at (952) 939-8598.

### **Calls for Service**

rough mid-November 2011,

the re department responded to more than 1,300 calls for service.

e three-person duty crew handles most calls, while about 35 paid-oncall members report to every structure re.

Calls included 569 medical calls, 206 re alarm calls, 186 lift assists, 96 good intent calls, 86 natural gas leaks or hazardous condition calls, 50 service calls (such as smoke removal), 49 mutual aid requests, 43 other re calls, 37 rescue calls and 19 building res.

# **School programs**

From September through November, the re department's public educators gave 71 re safety presentations to more than 1,800 elementary school students.

### Adopt-a-Hydrant

Year round, re hydrants stand ready to assist in stopping a re. Some people see them as an eyesore and try to camou age them with foliage or other items. In the winter, hydrants may spend months buried under the snow

With nearly 7,000 hydrants in the city, keeping hydrants accessible with three feet of clearance all around them is impossible without the help of residents.

e Minnetonka Fire Department asks you to adopt a re hydrant and keep it clear of snow in the winter and foliage in the summer, so that hydrants are visible and accessible all year round. •

# Tips for replace and winter safety

ireplaces during a Minnesota winter are cozy, but do you know how to keep your replaces and ashes safe when you are done burning? Each year, the Minnetonka Fire Department responds to res caused by improper disposal of replace ashes. Avoid a visit from re ghters by following these tips:

Chimneys should be swept at least once a year; more if you use your replace frequently.

> Open the ue before starting a re, and leave it open until the re is completely out.

When cleaning your replace, place ashes in a metal container with a lid. Never use plastic. Embers can stay hot for as long as two weeks after the re has stopped burning!

Place ashes away from buildings, including your home, garage, shed and your neighbors' homes.

appropriate tires, fully charged battery, full windshield wiper uid reservoir, etc. At the very least, be sure to have a snow and ice scraper in your vehicle.

- Dress in layered clothing and avoid over-exertion when you are outside during storms or extreme cold.
- Be cautious when shoveling snow it's very hard work and may induce a heart attack.
- Stay o thin ice. It takes at least four inches of clear ice to support an adult. No ice is 100% safe.
- Avoid mixing alcohol with snowmobiling — most snowmobile accidents are alcohol related. Take a snowmobile safety course through the Minnesota DNR, or check with a snowmobile dealer for courses.
- Heating res are a major cause of residential res in Minnesota. Turn o portable heating devices when you are away from home or when you go to bed at night. Have a working, ULlisted smoke alarm on every level of your home and in every bedroom.

Carbon monoxide is most likely to accumulate inside homes during the winter. Check your heating systems and ensure your home is properly

> carbon monoxide detector with alarm within 10 feet of every sleeping room. In multifamily dwellings, they may be placed between 15 and 25 feet from fuelred equipment. Detectors with digital readouts are highly recommended. \infty

# Got ash? Diversify your yard with the annual spring tree sale

By now, most homeowners have heard about the non-native invasive insect called emerald ash borer (EAB) that was found in St. Paul in 2009 and Minneapolis in 2010. EAB kills ash trees and has not been successfully eradicated in areas where it has been found.

While emerald ash borer has not yet been found in Minnetonka, the city is planning for its inevitable arrival. One of the best ways to prepare for EAB is to plant a diversity of species, so while annual chemical treatments are available to help prevent EAB from killing select trees, most homeowners should also begin planting new trees. is is especially true if your yard is overplanted with ash trees.

e city and the Minnesota Department of Agriculture do not recommend that homeowners cut down healthy ash trees, but it is important to get new trees established now to minimize tree losses over time. Trees serve many essential functions including absorbing storm water runo , preventing erosion, providing energy savings, cleaning the air, providing habitat and food for

birds and wildlife and beautifying the community.

e city's annual tree sale program allows residents to pre-order and pre-pay for up to two trees per property owner, with a tree pick-up day in early spring. Over ten di erent species will be o ered, ranging from three to seven feet tall at the time of purchase.

Watch the mail for the February *Minnetonka Memo* to nd an order form and list of available tree species. You can also check the city's website at *www. eminnetonka.com* to learn more about the trees o ered. Some species sell out quickly, so plan to send your order as early as possible!

If your homeowners' association would like to order trees through the city's tree sale program, please contact the city forester at (952) 988-8400 by February 1 to discuss your plans and receive authorization to place an order.

# What do I do with my old blue recycling bin?

You have several options for your old blue recycling bin. You can keep it and use it as you wish, or bring it to Minnetonka Public Works, 11522 Minnetonka Boulevard, and leave it in the designated area at the recycling drop-o center.

Or, starting on Wednesday, January 11, and continuing for four weeks, the bins will be picked up by the city. Please leave your empty bin at the end of your driveway on the appropriate pickup day. Collection in each area will start on Wednesday and continue until the bins are picked up, possibly through the end of the week (see map at right).

e recycling bin collection schedule is as follows (all dates are Wednesdays):

• **Area A:** January 11 (alternative collection: February 8)

• Area B: January 18
(alternative collection: February 15)

• Area C: January 25 (alternative collection: February 22)

• **Area D:** February 1 (alternative collection: February 29)

e alternative collection date will only be used if the public works sta has snow plowing or emergency infrastructure duties and the recycling bin collection is cancelled. Visit www. eminnetonka.com for details of any changes to the alternative collection dates.

- Area B: Tuesdays, Gray Weeks (January 10, 24; February 7, 21; March 6, 20; April 3, 17)
- Area C: Mondays, Gray Weeks (January 9, 23; February 6, 20; March 5, 19; April 2, 16, 30)
- Area D: Mondays, Blue Weeks (January 2, 16, 30; February 13, 27; March 12, 26; April 9, 23)

### Holiday recycling collection in 2012

In 2012, only three holidays will delay curbside recycling collection in Minnetonka and only for the residents whose service dates fall in the week with that holiday:

- Memorial Day, May 28
   If May 28 is in the week of your recycling service date, then collection is Tuesday, May 29, for residents west of I-494; and Wednesday, May 30, for residents east of I-494.
- Labor Day, Sept. 3
  If Sept. 3 is in the week of your recycling service date, then collection is Tuesday, Sept. 4, for residents west of I-494; and Wednesday, Sept. 5, for residents east of I-494.
- Christmas Day, Dec. 25

  If Dec. 25 is in the week of your recycling service date, then collection is Wednesday, Dec. 26, for residents east of I-494.
