City special election is Tuesday, February 14

Voters will have the rare opportunity this month to cast a ballot in the middle of winter. A special election to ll the vacant Council Member, At Large Seat B is set for February 14. e seat became vacant when former Council Member Amber Greves resigned the position in December.

If you have questions about the election, read on for the answers.

What are the hours to vote, and where do I vote?

Polling places will open at 7 a.m. Tuesday, February 14, and remain open until 8 p.m. If you are in line at 8 p.m., you will be allowed to vote. All voters will vote at their regular polling location, but it is possible that a few polling places will be located in di erent rooms than normal. Please look for signs when you get to your location.

Lindbergh Center voters: Please note that the Hopkins boys' basketball team has a home game on February 14 at 7 p.m., so please plan accordingly for parking at that time of the evening.

Voters may only vote in person at their assigned polling place. Be sure to know your correct polling place — it will save you time. To nd your speci c polling place, visit the Minnesota Secretary of State's website at www.sos.state.mn.us.

Can I register to vote on Election Day?

Minnesota allows voters to register to vote at the polls on Election Day. You will need to register if you have never registered to vote, if you have changed your name or address (including just moving to another apartment in the same building) since you last voted, or if you have not voted in four years.

State of the City event is Feb. 29

What identi cation is needed to register?

Minnesota state law requires specied forms of identication to register at the polling place. For more information about these forms, see the city's website at www.eminnetonka.com.

Who can vote absentee?

Absentee voting is available if you cannot get to the polling place on Election Day due to absence from the precinct, illness or disability, religious observance or service as an election judge in another precinct.

How do I vote absentee?

Absentee voting for the special election is available through Monday, February 13. Voters may vote in person at Minnetonka City Hall during regular business hours, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Extended absentee voting hours are available Saturday, February 11, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.; and Monday, February 13, until 5 p.m.

Voters may also absentee vote by mail by requesting an absentee ballot application at (952) 939-8200. Applications may also be downloaded from the election section at *www.eminnetonka.com*. Upon receipt of your completed application, a ballot will be mailed. Remember, the voted ballot must be received at city hall by Election Day for the vote to count.

Use caution and consideration this winter

If you like to skate, fish or walk on frozen lakes, ponds or other bodies of water, remember that cold temperatures don't guarantee safe ice. Ice can shift and underwater springs can cause ice to be unstable. Know the condition of your lake or pond, use caution and be safe.

In addition to watching out for your own safety, be considerate of the environment and of your neighbors. Pick up trash, clean

up after your dog and be aware of others who are using the lake or pond.

If you snowmobile on a permitted lake, (check *www.eminnetonka.com* for information) please be aware of people who are snowshoeing, cross country skiing or ice skating. Travel at a safe speed and distance from people, pets and objects, and avoid damaging cattails and other wetland vegetation.

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Lake Rose Park gets a new look

Restoration of native habitat in Lake Rose Park made big advances in 2011 due to a \$6,000 cost-share grant from the Nine Mile Creek Watershed District. e grant helped pay to plant native tree seedlings, shrubs and wild owers on a steep slope extending to the Lake Rose shoreline, which will slow runo and erosion on a slope where buckthorn was removed in 2008. Here's a short history of the project.

2005 - 2010

Buckthorn removal began with a few neighborhood volunteers working a little at a time from 2005 through 2007. In March 2008, neighbors and the city organized to cut a large stand of buckthorn on the shoreline of Lake Rose and the steep west-facing slope that descends to the undeveloped shoreline. In 2009, contractors cut more buckthorn and followed up with prescribed re and herbicide applications in the fall. Volunteers have pulled garlic mustard each spring since 2008.

2011 grant projects

In May 2011, volunteers and city sta worked three days to plant 750 bare-root native trees and shrubs, including oaks, hickories, cherries and dogwoods.

In September, volunteers spent three days planting 19 species of wild owers and sedges on the woodland slopes. After the last planting, wild ower seeds were collected from areas of plenty and direct-seeded close to the plantings.

Besides neighborhood volunteers, several very loyal roving volunteers came to this secluded park from other areas of the city. Boy Scout Adam Hauge organized a group of Scouts to continue erosion prevention work around individual plants and to build

plant protection cages for some of the young oaks and hickories. College student Ashley Mecum visited the park weekly throughout the summer to make improvements to each seedling's spot. She removed weeds, cut back vines, and placed sticks on the slope. All woodland debris was recycled on site as mulch for the new seedlings.



Winter tree pruning drop-o opens in March at Public Works

The city forester recommends November through March as the ideal time to prune oaks, as they are least susceptible to oak wilt disease during these months. is is also a great time to prune other trees, since insects and diseases are not active.

To assist residents who conduct proper winter pruning, the drop-o site at the

Minnetonka Public Works facility (11522 Minnetonka Blvd.) will be open Saturdays, March 3, 10, 17, 24 and 31, from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m.

e site will **not be open weekdays** in March. e regular brush drop-o program starts Monday, April 9.

Branches up to 12" in diameter will be accepted. Christmas trees (without plastic

bags, stands or decorations) will also be accepted. Proof of Minnetonka residency — driver's license or Minnetonka utility bill — is required to drop o brush.

Please note: trash, grass, leaves, dirt, sod, lumber, fencing, or wood scraps are **not** accepted.

No brush or trimmings will be accepted from commercial tree or lawn services.

Tips to stay safe in your home this winter

As winter drags on, heating bills pile up and homeowners begin searching out alternative heat sources. In addition to the traditional



replace burning wood or man-made logs, wood burning stoves and space heaters have become increasingly popular. When not managed properly, all of these heating methods may cause an unwanted re in your home.

e Minnetonka Fire Department's public educators o er these tips to help you keep your home safe from re this winter. If you have any questions about these tips, call the Minnetonka Fire Department at (952) 939-8331.

Kerosene heaters

- Inspect exhaust parts for carbon buildup and ensure the emergency shuto works.
- Never use fuel-burning appliances without proper ventilation — the fumes may be deadly.
- Use only the recommended fuel, and refuel the device outside the home.

Wood stoves and replaces

- Be sure wood stoves and replaces are properly installed.
- Have chimneys inspected annually.
- Don't use ammable liquids to start or accelerate any re.
- Use a re-resistant screen in front of the replace.

- Burn stoves hot twice daily to prevent creosote buildup.
- Don't use excessive amounts of paper to build a large re in the replace.
- Be sure the re is out before you go to sleep.
- Never shut the ue with hot ashes in the replace.

Furnaces

- Have your furnace inspected regularly and have repairs made by a certi ed specialist.
- Keep trash and combustibles away from the heating unit.
- Conduct a visual inspection of the entire furnace area, including walls, ue pipes and seams, and chimney exterior.

General safety tips

- Never place hot ashes inside or near your home, including in your garbage can.
- Never use a stove top or an oven to heat your home or kitchen.
- Don't overload a circuit with a space heater.
- Don't use electrical heaters in a bathroom or any other area in which the unit may come in contact with water.
- Never try to thaw frozen pipes with a torch or other open ame — use a hair dryer instead.
- Be sure your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms work properly. Install fresh batteries twice a year.

About passing on the shoulder

Most drivers know that passing another vehicle by using the shoulder or turn lane is illegal, but many don't realize that it's still illegal even when the car in front of them is stopped to make a left turn into a street or driveway, and even if the shoulder is paved.

Because passing on the shoulder or in a turn lane is dangerous—when drivers do so, other drivers can't see them or judge their intentions, and the driver who is passing doesn't always know why the front car stopped. e drivers being passed may have stopped for someone who is walking or for an object in the road. Driving on the shoulder also jeopardizes the safety of pedestrians and bicyclists who may be using the shoulder.
