



Conserve water throughout the summer

TN AN AVERAGE YEAR, THE TWIN CITIES METROPOLITAN AREA USES about 20 percent of its treated drinking water for outdoor purposes, such as lawn and garden watering and car washing. In dry years that figure can climb to more than 30 percent. Although it's too soon to tell if the metro region will experience the same drought conditions as the last two years, it is still a good idea to use water resources wisely all the time, not just during dry periods. Consider these tips to reduce outdoor water use:

- Convert lawns to native landscapes.
- Water early in the morning.
- Sweep with a broom instead of hose.
- Collect rain water in a rain barrel.
- Cut grass to no shorter than two inches to reduce evaporation and promote deep root growth.
- Use shut-off nozzles on hoses when washing cars.
- Calculate your water footprint at www.h2oconserve.org.

Using water wisely in landscaping

F YOU ENJOY LANDSCAPING BUT ALSO WANT TO CONSERVE WATER AND L protect local water quality, attend "Water Smart Landscaping" Tuesday, June 17, at 7 p.m. at the Ridgedale Library, 12601 Ridgedale Drive, Minnetonka.

Gregg Thompson of the Association of Metropolitan Soil and Water Conservation Districts will provide a general overview of Water Smart

Landscaping, including lawn aeration, lowvolume irrigation systems, rain gardens and rain barrels, and permeable paver driveways.

For those who provide informati ahead of time, Thompson will provide a personal



assessment of individual yards using high-quality aerial photography available via the Internet. To register, call (952) 847-8800.

Shade tree disease control program underway

THE CITY OF MINNETONKA'S SHADE TREE DISEASE CONTROL PROGRAM, designed to keep Dutch elm disease (DED) and oak wilt (OW) at bay, started June 2. If you see a tree you suspect to have DED or OW on your property or while driving around the city, you may report it by calling (952) 988-8421. Be prepared to give the address and a detailed description of the tree's location. The city's forestry staff will accept inspection requests and scout for diseased elm and oak trees until September 1, when it becomes difficult to identify the diseases by their leaf symptoms.

Two seasonal tree inspectors and the city forester have been certified by the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources and are inspecting public

and private properties throughout the city for trees showing symptoms of DED or OW, including wilting, curled leaves and branch death. On private property, they knock on the door to identify themselves before inspecting the tree. Both of these tree diseases are regulated by state statute and city ordinance.

If an elm tree or oak tree is found to have either of these diseases, it is important to act promptly with removal or the suggested treatments in order to protect other elms and oaks on your property and throughout the city.



Caution: turtles crossing

Have you ever wondered why turtles cross the road? here's a hint: it's not because they're trying to

get to the "shell" station. Many of the turtles crossing roadways in late spring are pregnant females looking for suitable upland areas in which to lay their eggs.

If you see a turtle trying to cross the road, do not put it back in the direction from which it came or it will simply try to cross the road again. Instead, give it a hand by gently lifting it by the shell and placing it off the roadway in the direction it was attempting to travel. Snapping turtles may be handled carefully by the back of the shell or both hind legs, but in order to prevent injury to yourself or others, keep the head clear of your body or anyone nearby. 💊



West metro residents now have a new east-west bus route traveling between Minnetonka and Hopkins, providing job seekers access to employment centers in both cities. Funding for the new service comes from a federal Job Access and Reverse Commute grant, which supports transportation services that improve access to employment opportunities.

The new Bus Route 612 provides eight eastbound and eight westbound trips on weekdays, and ten eastbound and nine westbound trips on Saturdays The route travels primarily on County Road 101 and Excelsior Boulevard, serving retail destinations in Minnetonka and downtown Hopkins.

The route is operated by Transit Team through a contract with the Metropolitan Council, and is considered a demonstration project, to last at least through September 2009.

When preparing for Route 612, planners at Metro Transit identified more than 4,500 entry-level jobs in the route's service area. Customers who take Route 612 also can transfer in downtown Hopkins to Route 12 and Route 615, providing access to even more employment centers such as Opus, Ridgedale, Knollwood, Uptown and downtown Minneapolis.

The cash fare for Route 612 is \$2 during weekday rush hours and \$1.50 at other times.

To celebrate the new service, transit customers can get a free children's ticket to see "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown" at Stages Theatre in downtown Hopkins. To receive the offer, customers must present a valid transit pass, bus transfer or rail ticket at the Stages Theatre Box Office and buy one adult ticket to the show. The production runs June 27 through Aug. 3.
