NLIKE ALICE AND THE CHESHIRE CAT, the city of Minnetonka and its residents care where the city is going, and how it's going to get there. For that reason, Minnetonka has been conducting comprehensive planning since 1962. Now, it's time to develop a new comprehensive plan, which will guide Minnetonka's development and public service through the year 2030.

To provide input on the development of the comprehensive plan, the Minnetonka City Council has appointed a steering committee of people who reflect the city's demographics, various geographic areas, household types (seniors, young families, singles, homeowners, renters, etc.) and tenure in the city, from new to long-time residents. The comprehensive plan will be prepared in three steps, which fall broadly under the headings of "Where do we want to go?" and "How will we get there?"

Residents celebrate opening of Headwaters Park

N WEDNESDAY, JUNE 13, SEVERAL hundred Minnetonka residents as well as officials from the Minnehaha Creek Watershed and city of Minnetonka gathered at the Minnehaha Creek Headwaters at Gray's Bay to celebrate improvements to the site.

Recent additions include a 920-foot boardwalk spanning the wetlands that mark the start of Minnehaha Creek; a viewing deck that has been placed over the



control structure for Minnehaha Creek and Gray's Bay; and, most recently, ten new interpretive signs about the history and ecology of the site.

Wander around the Headwaters and view a map of Minnehaha Creek's 22-mile winding route from Lake Minnetonka to the Mississippi River; learn how the Gray's Bay dam controls the water level of Lake Minnetonka and the flow of Minnehaha Creek; explore the four wetland zones of the Headwaters; find out how shore land restoration is taking place; and learn more about the history of Lake Minnetonka and Minnehaha Creek.

The new signs are provided by the city of Minnetonka, the Minnehaha Creek Watershed District, and the Lake Minnetonka Garden Club.

You are invited to visit the new trail, deck, and interpretive displays of the Headwaters, located at 16501 Gray's Bay Boulevard, while exploring the beauty of preserved wetlands in this unique area.

2007 community survey highlights

HERE ARE SOME HIGHLIGHTS FROM this year's community survey, conducted by Decision Resources, Inc.

- Minnetonka residents remain very satisfied with their quality of life, and the city ranks among the top four communities across the metropolitan area. Of those surveyed, 48% rated their quality of life as "excellent," while another 50% rated it as "good."
- In general, 79% of those surveyed think Minnetonka does "about the right amount" in protecting the environment, while 16% state it does "too little," and one percent rate the city as doing "too much."
- Of those surveyed, 76% believe the city has been successful in maintaining a balance between the rights of individual property owners to reasonably develop their properties with the desire of the community to preserve the natural environment and its surroundings.
- Minnetonka residents award seven city services a positive rating of 85% or higher: police services, park maintenance, fire protection, recycling service, snow plowing, water and sanitary sewer services, and recreational services and programs.
- Concerns about safety again prove lower than in other communities.
 Only four percent say there are areas in the community where they feel unsafe.
- In the next ten to 20 years, residents suggest two issues for city leaders to consider: 27% suggest "protect open space" and 16% say "limit growth."

Where do we want to go?

First, the city has focused on affirming community values, which fall into the five general categories of natural environment, public safety, transportation, development and community building.

This process included the 2007 resident survey; a comment card in the March *Minnetonka Memo;* a Web site survey; a focus group of business and civic representatives; a work session of the city council and its advisory boards; and a public open house. All of the information received from these public input opportunities was shared with the comprehensive plan steering committee, then presented to the city council for approval in May. The results were as follows:

• Natural Environment

By far the most highly rated value, residents enjoy the city's natural setting, want to protect open space, and have an obvious desire to limit growth. City leaders are also concerned about growth, although more in the sense of managing, rather than limiting, the growth. An environmentally conscientious message was evident, with recommendations to "go green" and conserve energy.

Public Safety

Another highly rated value, residents and city leaders seem quite content with the status quo for public safety. Looking to the future, high satisfaction ratings with the city's handling of public safety indicate the need for continued vigilance in providing sufficient resources for these services.

Transportation

Although not the most highly rated value, roads and traffic are a concern to residents and leaders alike. Especially of interest is the desire for a more "walkable" community, particularly given the shifting age demographics, and the development of light rail transit, which could result in the development of commercial nodes and more affordable housing options.

Development

Although residents highly value preserving open space, community leaders understand the need to balance this with the protection of individual property rights. Development issues center on the potential for in-fill development and increased density, as well as life-cycle housing to meet the needs of both an aging population and young families.

Building Community

Residents and leaders alike share a strong awareness of the looming "silver tsunami" and a desire to prepare for its effects on the community, including partnering with schools to ensure their continued viability.

How will we get there?

The second step is policy development. The city will assemble inventories of land use, traffic, demographics, housing, natural resources, and public service information. All of this information will help determine where the city wants to go, and how it will get there.

The final step is assembly of the comprehensive document, which will include a future land use plan for the entire city and for geographic focus areas; functional plans for sewer and water, storm water and housing; strategic service plans for transportation, parks and recreation and public safety; and implementation plans.

How you can get involved

One of the key activities of the comp plan update is public involvement. The city invites residents, business owners and others with an interest in Minnetonka to learn about and participate in the creation of the comprehensive plan in the following ways:

Stay Informed

Read the monthly *Minnetonka Memo*, visit the city Web site at *www.eminnetonka. com*, watch cable channel 16, or sign up for the weekly Hot Topics e-newsletter

(also at *www.eminnetonka.com*). All of these outlets will contain periodic information about the comp plan process and provide ways to offer feedback and suggestions to the steering committee and city council.

• Visit an open house

Mark your calendar for October 25, 2007, when a public open house will include presentation of the comp plan development process, review of background information, and presentation of draft issues and opportunities. Additional open houses will take place in March and June 2008.

• Participate in a focus group

At least three focus groups, consisting of individuals who are knowledgeable about the topic areas, will be convened in late 2007 and early 2008. Focus groups have been suggested for the following topics: housing, business, senior services, staff services, family services, and schools and social service agencies. Other topics may arise as the comp plan process continues.

Attend a formal public hearing

As required by law, Minnetonka will hold formal public hearings prior to adoption of the plan. These hearings will take place at planning commission and city council meetings to ensure all interested parties have a say in the process. Move over for emergency vehicles!

MOVING OVER ONE LANE FOR EMERGENCY VEHICLES PARKED ON THE shoulder is not just a courtesy — now it's the law!

Designed to give emergency vehicles room to work on the portion of the roadway they are occupying, the "move over" or "Ted Foss" law (MN state law 169.18, subd. 11) requires that, "When approaching and before passing an authorized emergency vehicle that is parked or otherwise stopped on or next to a street or highway having two or more lanes in the same direction, the driver of a vehicle shall safely move the vehicle to a lane away from the emergency vehicle to leave one lane vacant between the vehicles they are driving and parked emergency vehicles on the road."

In Minnesota, an emergency vehicle is defined as a tow truck, fire truck, police car or ambulance. So, the next time you see an emergency vehicle on the side of the road, move over and give them some room! •

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Do you live near a lake or a creek? These changes may affect you!

If you live within 1,000 feet of a lake or 300 feet of a creek, then changes to the city of Minnetonka's shoreland ordinance may affect you! The ordinance is being amended to incorporate changes required by the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, and will regulate all land surrounding lakes and creeks in order to protect and enhance their quality.

Below are some highlights of the proposed changes.

Who does it affect?

The definition of a shoreland district has changed and will now include all land within 1,000 feet of a lake or 300 feet of a creek. Previously, the ordinance only applied to land within 300 feet of a lake, and did not include creek property.

What's new in the ordinance?

The ordinance contains new sections on roads, parking areas, stairway landings, lifts, and controlled accesses. The new ordinance will allow more yard-type uses (sport courts, pools, fences) closer to the shore than is currently allowed.

It also outlines requirements for a shoreland buffer area for every creek and lake property, including new developments, redevelopment, and when the city requires a buffer as part of a variance, conditional use permit or site plan review.

Where can I find more details?

For a detailed guide to the proposed changes, a map, and the text of the proposed ordinance, visit the city's Web site at *www.eminnetonka.com* The ordinance is tentatively scheduled to be heard before the July 26, 2007, meeting of the Minnetonka Planning Commission.

Front desk staff must be 17 years of age or older. Hours range Mondays through Saturdays 5:30 a.m. – 11 p.m., and Sundays 10 a.m. – 8 p.m. Starting pay ranges \$7.50 – \$9 depending on qualifications. Anticipated start date is August 1.

Are your trees and shrubs thirsty?

If RAINFALL IS INADEQUATE (LESS THAN one inch per week), your trees and shrubs will benefit from summer watering. In most cases, water and mulch are the two surest ways to ensure a tree's strength. Last summer's drought conditions left many trees and shrubs in a stressed condition going into winter. Follow these summer watering tips:

- The best way to tell if your trees need water is to feel the soil.
- Water low, slow and deep, avoiding water runoff.
- Water to the dripline the ends of the branch tips.
- Avoid sprinkling open wounds on tree trunks. Moisture provides a friendly environment for decay.
- If the root zone is mulched, less water is required. Organic mulch—such as wood chips, shredded bark, etc.—helps retain soil moisture.
- Trees and shrubs have different watering needs than a lawn. Irrigation systems may not give trees the water they need.
- Conserve water by not watering during the day when water readily evaporates.
 Evening and morning are best.



- More than 300 fifth-grade Minnetonka school district students completed 2006-07 CounterAct instruction, taught by the Minnetonka Police Department. The program's goal is to give students the skills to resist drug and alcohol use.
- In March, the **Minnetonka Explorer Post** and its members were recognized in three categories at the Northern Star Council's annual Exploring Banquet. Officer Kelly Phillips received the Explorer Advisor of the Year award; Explorer Eric Gunderson was named Explorer of the Year; and the entire Minnetonka Explorer Post received a Marketing Award for their recruiting video. Year after year, the Minnetonka Explorer Post has been recognized as one of the best in the state, and the program continues to be strong thanks to its members and advisors.
- On March 17, St. Patrick's Day, the Minnetonka Police
 Department traffic unit participated in Operation Night Cap, a
 statewide initiative to keep impaired drivers off the roads. A total
 of 339 vehicles were stopped with 185 citations written and 34
 people arrested for DWI.

- On May 12, the police department traffic unit presented "Driving Safely While Aging Gracefully" to a group of 60 seniors. The class is intended for drivers over the age of 55 who are interested in learning how to adjust their driving habits as grow older.
- The police department summer trail patrol started June 1 and will continue through the end of August, with a goal of visibility, education and interaction with trail system users.
- The second month of the police department's supplemental traffic enforcement effort is complete and was very successful.
 During May, officers made 241 traffic contacts and wrote 84 citations. By comparison, in April officers initiated 142 traffic contacts and wrote 61 citations.
- On May 19 the police department's traffic unit, along with the Coon Rapids Police Department and South Lake Minnetonka Public Safety, conducted a **car seat inspection clinic** at Minnetonka Fire Station #2, during which officers inspected and installed 19 car seats. Officers advised parents on proper installation and how to inspect their own car seats to ensure safety. The police department had new car seats available for families with out-of-compliance seats; three of those were given out at no charge.


