


WE INVITE YOU AND YOUR FAMILY TO MINNETONKA'S BACKYARD—





THIS AUGUST, MINNETONKA residents are invited to join thousands of other communities across America in supporting National Night Out, a unique crime prevention project sponsored by National Town Watch Association.

Tuesday, Aug. 1, between 6 and 9 p.m., residents citywide and across the nation will be asked to turn on their outside lights, lock their doors and spend an evening visiting with neighbors. New fields available at Civic Center

VER THE PAST YEAR, THE MINNETONKA CIVIC CENTER CAMPUS has undergone major renovation, including the development of a large athletic field space just north of Ice Arena B. This space, which is the equivalent of two regulation-size soccer fields, is designed to fill a shortage of practice field space for several community sports organizations.

Construction of fields began in the fall of 2005 and included several measures to ensure quality turf conditions, including special drainage design, irrigation systems, and high quality seeding to accommodate intensive use. The new athletic fields space will be ready for play this September.

The Minnetonka Park Board recently developed recommended scheduling guidelines for use of the field, which were then approved by the city council in late April. The policy states that the new athletic field will be available for city program use as a first priority, followed by community soccer organizational use, then use by other community field sports including football, lacrosse, field hockey, rugby and ultimate Frisbee.

New voting technology introduced

▲ S PART OF THE HELP AMERICA VOTE ACT, A NEW TECHNOLOGY called Assistive Voting Technology (AVT) will be implemented in the city of Minnetonka for the 2006 election season. This technology allows voters with disabilities to vote independently and privately.

In Minnetonka and statewide, the certified AVT is a ballot marking device called the ES&S AutoMARK, which marks the voter's paper ballot via touch screen, touch pad or sip/puff tube. All ballots voted in Hennepin County during the 2006 election, whether the voter uses a pen or the new ballot marking device, will be inserted in the precinct ballot counters that have been used in the county since 2000. The state of Minnesota requires that all elections have a paper ballot as a "paper trail" for election recounts.

The ballot marking device will be available for demonstration starting July 5 and continuing through Sept. 11, at Minnetonka City Hall, 14600 Minnetonka Blvd., Minnetonka, between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. For more information contact Laura Ronbeck at (952) 939-8219 or at lronbeck@eminnetonka.com. ~

Fighting Dutch elm disease

INNETONKA IS ONE OF MANY METRO-AREA CITIES TO EXPERIENCE above-average rates of Dutch elm disease in the past few years. However, many beautiful elms remain in Minnetonka, and now is the time to consider protecting them from Dutch elm disease.

The best way to manage the disease is to remove, chip and burn dying elms and elm wood piles so that bark beetles do not have a place to lay their eggs. The only way to prevent an elm from contracting Dutch elm disease is by injecting it with a chemical that prevents the disease from establishing itself in the tree, and spring and summer is the time for these injections. To help make a decision on injection, consider the following commonly asked questions and their answers. For more information call (952) 988-8400, or visit www.eminnetonka.com.

How do I decide if a tree should be injected?

Before deciding to inject a tree against Dutch elm disease, you should be able to answer yes to the following questions, and keep in mind the financial commitment that must be made very two to three years to keep up on the injections necessary to protect the tree.

- Is the tree structurally sound and in good health?
- Does the tree shade a large portion of your yard or home, thus offering potential energy savings in the summer?
- Does the tree add significant aesthetic and real estate value to your

What is tree injection?

To protect a tree against Dutch elm disease, a chemical is injected near the base of the tree. When the chemical is injected correctly, the tree takes it up into the crown of the tree where it is evenly distributed to protect the elm against bark beetles, which transmit about 80 percent of all new Dutch elm disease cases. The other 20 percent of DED infections occur through shared root systems between healthy and diseased elms.

What chemicals are used? Can I do it myself?

Two main chemicals are used to protect a tree from Dutch elm: thiabendazole hypophosphite (known as Arbotect) and propiconazole (known as Alamo and other generic brands), neither of which are sold at retail stores. The procedure should be conducted by a certified arborist or a tree care specialist who is trained in tree injection.

Can injections save an elm that is already diseased?

The injections may be used therapeutically in certain cases when the disease is caught very early, and is only effective if the disease infects five percent or less of the tree's upper canopy. After a therapeutic injection, the diseased branch portion must be removed. The chemical is not effective if the tree contracted the disease through shared roots from a nearby diseased elm or if it is present in a branch too close to the trunk. Tree inspectors make residents aware of the possibility of therapeutic injection before marking a diseased elm for removal on private property. Keep in mind the disease progresses each day, so swift treatment is necessary to save the tree.

What if an elm becomes diseased in the two- to three-year time period it was supposed to be protected?

Most companies offer a warranty when they inject a healthy elm, so that if the tree gets Dutch elm within the protection period, your money is refunded. Each company's warranty varies so it is important to get the details before you decide on a treatment. Obtain quotes from at least two companies and have the warranty in writing. Most companies have kept track of their success and failure rates, and are willing to share them if you ask. Several full-service tree care companies who work in Minnetonka offer injection services. If your elm tree is diseased and you have hired a company to perform therapeutic injection and pruning, please contact Emily Barbeau, city forester, at (952) 988-8400 to avoid unnecessary tagging by a tree inspector. •


