Minnetonka Summer Festival



Celebrate National Night Out

This august, minnetonka residents are invited to join thousands of other communities across America in supporting National Night Out, a unique crime prevention project sponsored by National Town Watch Association.

Tuesday, August 2, between 6 and 9 p.m., residents citywide and across the nation will be asked to turn on their outside lights, lock their doors and spend an evening visiting with neighbors. National Night Out is designed to heighten crime and drug prevention awareness; generate support and participation in local anti-crime efforts; strengthen



neighborhood spirit and police/community relations; and send a message to criminals that neighborhoods are organized and fighting back.

Filings open July 5 for fall election

The city of Minnetonka will hold municipal elections this fall. The city positions that will be on the November 8 General Election ballot are mayor and council—at—large, seats A and B. Filings for these offices open on Tuesday, July 5, and remain open through Tuesday, July 19. Interested persons may file for these offices during regular city hall hours, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. The filing fee is \$5.

To be eligible for office, candidates must be at least 21 years of age upon assuming office, and be a resident of Minnetonka for at least 30 days prior to the General Election.

A Primary Election will be held Tuesday, Sept. 13, if more than two people file for any of these offices.

All three school districts (Hopkins, Minnetonka, and Wayzata) will have school board positions on the fall ballot. We do not yet know if they will have referendum questions. People interested in filing for school district offices must contact the district offices. District filings may also trigger a primary election.

City to make roads a top priority

Does it seem like you are dodging more potholes than usual on Minnetonka streets? Does the overall condition of our road system seem worse than it was a few years ago?

If you answered yes, we agree with you. Minnetonka has fallen behind on street maintenance. The freeze—thaw cycles of our recent mild winters are hard on street surfaces, but that's not the main reason our streets are in worse shape.

More importantly, available funding has not kept pace with rising construction and maintenance costs. City streets are supported with a combination of state gas taxes and city property taxes. While we've increased our local commitment, state funding has been frozen at the same dollar level for the past decade.

Despite the introduction of higher technology patching equipment, adoption of new paving techniques, and efforts to deploy road crews more efficiently, we're still losing ground to the potholes. In response, the city is developing a strategy to smooth the bumpy road for our residents.

The city council is now considering a comprehensive plan to renew our roads over the next decade, and keep them in shape for decades to come. As these plans for maintenance and reconstruction are enacted, we'll be sharing the details in future *Minnetonka Memos*.

County Rd. 101 construction begins

HENNEPIN COUNTY HAS BEGUN RECONSTRUCTION OF COUNTY ROAD 101 from north of Highway 7 to north of Minnetonka Boulevard, a project expected to last three years. Some work has already begun, including clearing trees on the west side of Cty. Rd. 101 for the relocation of electrical poles and grading operations to provide an area for utility relocation. Other plans for 2005 include:

- Construction of several retaining walls, followed by construction of temporary lanes on the east side of the roadway. This fall, traffic will be diverted to the temporary lanes, allowing permanent road reconstruction on the west side of Cty. Rd. 101 to begin in spring 2006.
- Relocation of fire hydrants; installation of a portion of the storm sewer and sanitary sewer; and installation of new water services.
- City street reconstruction on Powderhorn Drive, Powderhorn Circle, Arrowhead Trail and Arrowhead Court.

The new Cty. Rd. 101 will include a three-lane section from south of Lake Street Extension to Minnetonka Blvd., including a northbound, southbound and continuous center turn lane, as well as a new bike trail along the east side of Cty. Rd. 101 from Minnetonka Blvd. to the Super Target intersection; upgrades at the Cty. Rd. 101 and Minnetonka Blvd. intersection; addition of retaining walls along the length of the project; upgrades to storm and sanitary sewers; traffic signal upgrades at the Super Target intersection, Lake Street Extension and Minnetonka Blvd.; and a new signal at Ridgewood Road.

Coping with road construction

If the road construction season is already testing your patience, consider this advice for maintaining your sanity and your safety, courtesy of the Minnetonka Police Department.

- Check out your route before you leave home, and plan an alternate route if necessary. Visit www.eminnetonka.com for the latest information on local road projects and road closures, including I-494, or visit the Minnesota Department of Transportation Web site at www.dot.state.mn.us.
- Use designated detour routes and avoid taking shortcuts through residential areas. Detour routes generally use non-residential roads that are able to handle a higher volume of traffic. This places less traffic on smaller residential streets where noise, speed and the safety of children is a primary concern. Remember, you wouldn't want your own neighborhood street turned into a freeway, so be considerate.
- Do not drive over, through or around any barricade, fence or obstruction erected for the purpose of preventing traffic from passing. Doing so places you and construction workers at risk of being injured, and also risks damage to your vehicle. Drivers who disobey these traffic control devices can be issued a traffic citation, a misdemeanor with a maximum penalty of up to 90 days in jail and a \$700 fine.
- As hard as it is, be patient. Road construction is inconvenient
 while underway but ultimately improves roadways and traffic
 flow. So relax, take a deep breath, and enjoy a new way of getting
 where you need to go.



Look out for Dutch elm disease

LAST SUMMER, THE TWIN CITIES SAW A RISE IN THE OCCURRENCE OF Dutch elm disease, and this year is expected to be similar. The city of Minnetonka forestry staff will be doing everything possible to control the disease, including the use of tree inspectors certified by the Minnesota Department of Agriculture who will be working throughout the city to mark dead or dying elms. Here are some ways you can help.

Identifying Dutch elm disease

Dutch elm disease occurs when a fungus, carried by a bark beetle, is introduced into the water-conducting system of the tree. Symptoms include wilting and yellow leaves. Where elm trees are growing close to each other, the disease also can spread directly from tree to tree because the root systems often fuse together.

Controlling Dutch elm disease

A good Dutch elm disease program aims to keep the bark beetle population in check so that elm mortality stays low. You can help in the following ways:

- Call in and report dead or dying elm trees in Minnetonka.
- Dispose of elm wood by chipping or bring it to the city's brush drop-off site.
- If you have a diseased elm, please comply with the city ordinance that requires removal within 20 days.



Nearly 60 volunteers gathered for this year's May Arbor Day/Earth Day planting event at Big Willow Park. The volunteers worked with Emily Barbeau, assistant city forester, to plant red cedar trees in an area of the park that has lost many elms to Dutch elm disease.

Elm bark beetles feed in healthy elms and breed in dead or dying elms, including elm firewood with intact bark. As long as there are elms there will be bark beetles, but eliminating their breeding site helps to keep the population lower, which means less elms will die.

Preventing Dutch elm disease

If you have large elms in your yard, consider having them injected with a preventive systemic fungicide such as Alamo or Arbotect. Many companies offer this service and will provide a warranty if the injection is done on healthy elms. When weighing the cost of fungicide application, also consider the value the tree brings in terms of shade, aesthetics, property value and energy savings.
