


Quality services at a reasonable price

Our residents consistently rank Minnetonka's services as a good value for the money. However, during recent years, we've had to absorb state revenue cuts of up to a million dollars a year within artificial levy limits. Specifically, the city of Minnetonka enacted spending caps to save \$3 million over five years and cut capital spending by 10 percent.

These cuts have affected basic city services like public safety, street and park maintenance. To meet our residents' expectations, the 2005 budget increases by about four percent, from \$21.4 million to \$22.3 million. Nearly nine out of every 10 new dollars are used to restore these service priorities, and fully 60 percent of the additional dollars are dedicated to public safety improvements.

2005 funding uncertainty

Property taxes pay for more than two-thirds of Minnetonka's general operating budget, with the remainder coming mainly from service charges. While the city receives no general state aid, the state has required the city to pay for the state's Market Value Credit (MVC) property tax relief program for the past two years. The state has promised to resume its responsibility for this \$800,000 unfunded mandate beginning in 2005.

If the state honors its pledge, city taxes would only increase by one-half of one percent in 2005. However, the state still faces another billion-dollar deficit, so this likelyhood is very uncertain. Since it would not be responsible to spend these state funds before they are received, taxes must increase by 4.5 percent. If any of the promised funds are actually received in late 2005, their use will be determined in the 2006 budget discussions.



Your 2005 Property Taxes 🚥

Minnetonka's 4.5 percent property tax increase for 2005 is among the lowest for comparable cities.

You will soon receive a county notice that estimates the property taxes your school district, county and city might collect in 2005. Your actual tax statement will arrive in the spring. Because of various state law changes, this notice can be confusing. As explained on this page, Minnetonka homeowners and businesses will see larger increases in their total tax bills due to many factors.



Property Tax Notice

The tax notice you receive does not distinguish between the city's 4.5 percent tax increase (4.0 percent of which is for the state's MVC program) and an additional 2.3 percent increase our voters approved in the park and open space referendum. The city accounts for about one-fourth of your total tax bill.

Total 2005 property taxes for the average Minnetonka homeowner could be \$101 to \$361 higher than this year. City, county, and school taxes account for less than 20 percent of this increase.

Most significantly, the state is phasing out a program that artificially held down market values for many years. This means that about 60 percent of our homeowners will experience even greater increases in their property tax bills. Faster growth in residential market value further compounds this tax shift.

The state takeover of school funding also complicates the property tax picture. However, total 2005 property taxes on the average valued home are roughly similar to total 2001 taxes prior to this

major tax reform.

Minnetonka residents may bring bagged leaves, yard and garden materials to one of the four drop-off sites on the dates and times shown below. Brush larger than 1/2" in diameter will <u>not</u> be accepted at leaf drop-off sites.

November 20 is the last day to drop off bulk leaves!

Truck and trailer loads of bulk leaves will only be accepted at the Public Works facility, 11522 Minnetonka Blvd. Enter on the west side of the building across from the Big Willow ball fields. Residents will unload their own leaves onto the bulk pile (bring proper equipment to unload your own leaves). Using many layers of tarps between a foot or two of leaves makes unloading your leaves easier and faster. Try it!

BAGGED LEAVES accepted at all sites on Saturday dates (11/6, 11/13)

City staff will assist residents with unloading bags of leaves on Saturdays. Residents will be asked to take empty bags home for reuse or disposal. **Please loosely tie bags for easier emptying.**

Loads of leaves MUST be covered during transport.

If you have other means of handling your leaves such as collection by your garbage hauler or backyard composting, please use that option. All garbage haulers offer curbside collection of yard waste on the same day as garbage collection for a reasonable annual or monthly fee. Check with your garbage hauler for details.

Brush drop-off will end November 20, 2004

THE BRUSH DROP-OFF site is open Monday and Tuesday from noon to 8 p.m. and on Saturdays from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Branches up to 8" in diameter will be accepted. This service is only available to Minnetonka residents—a valid I.D. is required.

Please note: trash, dirt, rocks, grass, loose leaves, lumber, or wood scraps are not accepted. (The brush is ground into the mulch that the city gives away to residents for landscaping.) Loose leaves, grass, pine needles, straw, plant and garden materials go to the leaf drop-off program.

No brush will be accepted from commercial tree or lawn services. The brush drop-off program will re-open April 11, 2005. For more information call Dean Elstad, city of Minnetonka recycling coordinator, at (952) 939-8217. □

The Bos of snow removal in Minnetonka

AUTUMN IS HERE, and snowflakes can't be far behind. Here are some reminders about snow removal in Minnetonka, as well as a few tips for enjoying the winter weather safely!

A dopt a hydrant! Minnetonka has more than 3,500 hydrants and it's impossible for the city to clear them all. Your contribution could save precious minutes in the event of a fire in your neighborhood.

B acking up is something snowplows do many times during snow removal operations. Please give them space to do their jobs.

lear snow from your driveway, but don't push it into or across the street. City ordinances require that snow be placed on the right-of-way adjacent to your property.

iscourage kids from playing in or tunneling through the large piles of snow left behind by plows. Snow piles can collapse and trap children; while passing snowplows could hit the pile and injure children hidden inside. The backyard is a fun—and safe—place to play in the snow!

very snow operation requires city crews to clear 1,100 miles of roadway—the equivalent of driving to Nashville, Tennessee!

F rost patrol starts in December and continues through February. Public Works employees are on the roads at 5 a.m. five days a week to check for frost and light snow. Should they find these conditions, a salt/sand mix is spread to increase traction and promote melting.

arbage cans and recycling containers should be set out behind the curb line so they won't be knocked over by snowplows or the snow coming off the plow.

H ave patience—in an average snowfall, it's a three-day operation to clear (in this order) parking lots, sidewalks, trails and ice rinks. Removal of snow from the city streets (see "I") is the first priority, and since the amount of personnel and equipment working on the parking lots, sidewalks, trails and ice rinks is smaller, it takes more time to clear these areas.

n an average snowfall, it is the goal of Public Works to clear snow from the streets and cul-de-sacs within 10 hours.

ust about every day...that's how often sanding trucks work during a normal winter, with major sanding efforts occurring about 25 times per year. Major plowing events occur about 12 times each year.

eep parked vehicles off city streets between 2 and 6 a.m., according to city ordinance. Illegally parked vehicles may hinder snowplows from fully clearing streets. Contact the Minnetonka Police Department at (952) 939-8500 if you are concerned about a vehicle parked in your street.

L ace on your snowshoes, or ice skates, or skis, and enjoy the winter weather!

ailboxes that are physically hit and damaged by city snowplows will be repaired. However, mailboxes that are damaged from the *force of snow coming off the plow* will not be repaired.

o county or state highways or private roads are plowed by city personnel. They are only responsible for city roadways.

ver the bridge and through the woods to grandmother's house you go! But drive slowly, as bridges are notoriously slick in the winter even when surrounding roadways are not.

put in curb markers to show the edge of your lawn or driveway and make the snowplow driver's job easier. The city provides free markers to residents—stop by Minnetonka City Hall, 14600 Minnetonka Blvd., or the Public Works Facility, 11522 Minnetonka Blvd, to pick up your markers. Remember, installation is easier when the ground isn't frozen solid!

uality snowballs begin with wet, heavy snow. Never underestimate the power of a snowball fight to bring out your inner kid!

Respect snowplows, both as a pedestrian and as a motorist. Snowplows travel much slower than the posted speed and the driver's field of vision is severely limited. Never pass on the right, since plows are pushing snow and spreading sand to the right. Stay 70 feet (four car lengths) from the snowplow so the driver can see you.

od damage resulting from city snowplows will be repaired by the city. The city does not repair sprinklers, fences or rock gardens that are placed in the city right-of-way. Report sod damage through the Public Works department at (952) 988-8400 or through Minnetonka Mike at www.eminnetonka.com. Repairs usually are made in May and June.

wo or more inches of snow accumulation marks the beginning of city-wide snow removal. In most cases, plowing operations begin between midnight and 4 a.m.; the exact time depends on the predicted start of the snowfall, its intensity and the expected end of the snowfall.

sing cruise control in your vehicle is not recommended when driving on snow- or ice-covered roads.

ehicles—more than 29 ranging from dump trucks to motorgraders to pickups—have been prepped by the Public Works department and are ready for snow removal service this winter.

eather forecasts are useful in preparing for the conditions. Keep up on forecasts. Drive carefully, even if the streets have been plowed and sanded.

*\$@#!—or something similar—might be uttered by a Minnetonka resident watching a snowplow fill in a newly shoveled driveway. Remember, during heavy snowfalls, citywide snowplowing is accomplished in three separate steps:

- The first pass provides an initial access path down the streets.
- Full-width plowing can occur a couple of hours later after all streets have received a first pass.
- Final cleanup occurs the next day and provides for intersection cleanup, sanding and plowing where vehicles were parked.

ou can call the Public Works Department at (952) 988-8400 if you have any questions about snow removal in Minnetonka. Or, if your concern does not require an immediate response, contact Minnetonka Mike at www.eminneton-ka.com or (952) 939-8586.

Z ones are assigned to each snowplow driver. Most drivers stay in that area for the entire winter, allowing him or her to become very familiar with the roadway features in a specific area. Mainline, or collector, streets are plowed first with residential streets and cul-desacs plowed last.

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I-494 lanes to switch in November 😈

WITH THE APPROACH of winter, a great deal of progress can already be seen on the I-494 design-build project. Working two shifts to beat the colder weather that makes paying all but impossible, crews have already constructed most

paving all but impossible, crews have already constructed most of the temporary lanes along the east side of the freeway. Once the new lanes are in place and cross-street bridges are widened, all southbound traffic between Minnetonka Boulevard and Highway 5 will be shifted through the median onto what is



currently northbound I-494, while northbound drivers will be shifted to the east onto the new temporary lanes. A concrete barrier will separate traffic. This traffic shift is currently scheduled for mid-November.

With southbound traffic out of the way, construction crews will demolish and rebuild the southbound lanes of I-494, adding a travel lane and barrier wall in the median. Once that work is completed (sometime in the summer of 2005) all traffic will be shifted back across the median onto the new lanes and the same reconstruction will occur on northbound I-494.

In all, approximately eight miles of I-494 and 13 cross-street bridges will be reconstructed and widened between now and the summer of 2006. A new pedestrian bridge also will be added to replace the one that was removed south of Excelsior Boulevard. Additionally, the collector distributor road on I-394 between I-494 and Plymouth Road will be widened and Ridgedale Drive, the business access road that runs parallel to I-394, also will be reconstructed beginning in early 2005.


