Minnesota switches to presidential primary in 2020

The process to select major-party presidential candidates will look different in Minnesota in 2020. Instead of caucus straw polls, the state will hold a nomination primary election on Tuesday, March 3.

The move to a presidential primary will ensure more people are able to participate in the nomination process via absentee voting, same-day registration and special opportunities for those serving overseas.

Absentee voting begins Jan. 17

Anyone can vote absentee online, by mail or in person in the presidential primary beginning Jan. 17. Vote absentee in-person at city hall, Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m.

2020 utility rates

In December, the Minnetonka City Council voted to adjust residential and commercial utility rates for 2020. The adjustments maintain service delivery and fund necessary improvements to the city's utility infrastructure.

Why do utility rates increase?

Funds from utility fees help the city proactively improve and replace important infrastructure, including water and sewer mains. Due to aging infrastructure, the city averages close to 100 water main breaks each year, which result in damage, service interruptions and expensive repairs. Improving and replacing this infrastructure keeps service running smoothly, avoids major headaches and is more costeffective for all involved.

Storm sewer rate increases help fund storm water-related infrastructure improvements, typically done in conjunction with street reconstruction projects, and federal water quality mandates.

Reduce water consumption

Minnetonka residents pay a base fee for water and sewer utilities, and incur additional charges based on usage. If you want to save money and help the environment, check out these ideas to reduce your water consumption.

- Don't let water run when brushing teeth or shaving.
- Use a dishwasher instead of handwashing, and only run the dishwasher when it's full.
- Showers account for 30 percent of home water use. A low-flow shower head and shorter showers can make a big difference.
- Fix leaks. A constantly dripping faucet can waste up to 20 gallons a day.
- Don't use running water to thaw foods.

After a snowfall, shovel out a fire hydrant near your home to ensure it's easily accessible. This will save our fire department precious time in an emergency.



Did you know?

Minnetonka has more than 3,500 fire hydrants. The space between each hydrant is approximately 500 feet.

Year-round

Though snow is the main perpetrator in our climate, consider adopting your hydrant year-round. In the summer, trim plants nearby to keep hydrants easily visible and accessible.

Inspect your home's insulation

Has your heating bill increased substantially? That could be a sign that the insulation in your home is deteriorating and needs to be improved or replaced. Here are other signs insulation improvements may be needed.

- Water or moisture in your attic
- Giant icicles These often indicate you're losing heat through your roof and need new attic insulation.



- **Cold walls, floors, ceilings** If these are cold or damp to touch, you may need new insulation.
- **Temperatures vary** Different room-to-room temperatures and drafts can be a sign insulation is failing in certain areas.
- **Insulation conditions** Insulation that is crumbling or breaking apart should be replaced.
- **Pests** Mice or bugs can indicate an opening letting in cold air.

Investigate your insulation or contact a professional if any of these are present in your home. If home improvements are needed, please remember a permit may be required. Email us at permits@minnetonkamn.gov to ask questions and learn more.

PLEDGE TO BE SALT SMART



1. Shovel

Clear walkways before snow turns to ice. Apply salt only if needed.



2. Select

Salt doesn't melt ice below 15°F. Use sand for traction when it's too cold, or a different de-icer.



3. Scatter

Use salt only where critical. Aim for three inches of space between salt granules.



4. Sweep

Clean up leftover salt, sand, and de-icer to save and reuse as needed.
