I appreciate you reaching out through the City Attorney. On Monday night's Council Session I commented that I appreciate the Charter Commission's role, look forward to their recommendation, and keep an open mind as I am not an expert in Ranked Choice Voting.

My suggestions:

- 1. Cost, Implementation, and Software. I believe there is a lot of data on improving systems to count RCV ballots as it has become more common. As one councilmember, I'd like to hear specifics on the latest related to how Minnetonka staff can use or license any systems to quickly process RCV ballots in a safe manner. I understand handcounts were the old way and this is transitioning, but don't know specifics. If there is a way to connect again with Minneapolis or other cities to learn about the system and cost that would be helpful. Obviously, comparing apples to apples in staff time and dollars of existing v. RCV would be best.
- 2. **Exhausted Ballots**. I believe there is an opinion out there about RCV "exhausted ballots" and a ballot not counting towards the final winner. My personal take is that concept is not unique to RCV, but a standard ballot can also select a losing candidate--the difference is when in the process is the ballot "exhausted." That said, I'd prefer the City and Charter Commission comment/address "exhausted ballots" as I highly value each vote (I won my election in recount by 3 votes) and real and perceived concerns about ballots counting.

This presentation is meant to emphasize "How the everyday Mtka voter would see RCV affecting their lives & City." A presentation was made to the League of Women Voters – Minnetonka, Eden Prairie, & Hopkins Chapter a year ago at the invitation of President Peggy Kvam by this Writer.

In a perfect world, RCV is a wonderful way to proceed as it allows more citizens to participate; it can eliminate the high costs of having a 2nd election-in the case of run-offs OR reduces even the historical concept of a party affiliated Election; (ie Democrats & Republicans can run against each other at the One & Only Election); it allows the poor man's Candidate to run; it would reduce the high cost of money spent to try & win an election; it would eliminate "Strategic Voting" meaning where a campaign group would tell their people to NOT participate in any Second Choice Ranked Voting.

In summary, positive results for choosing RCV includes: less money for Minnetonka to spend conducting elections; Candidates of any "stripe" can run; allows for a more diverse choice of the many participants; eliminates Party Affiliation candidates (depending); their would be no Strategic voting by a political party/ group.

However, from a practical standpoint, it is a far different case when a potential voter is standing at the ballot box.

RVC will not work because the Voters under RCV, are not going to place an X in column 1 for Candidate 1, then place another X for Candidate 3 in column 2, then place an X in column 3 for Candidate 5, ETC.

Then start same process over the Second Elective Office, >>> place an X in column 1 for Candidate 2, then in column 2, place an X next to candidate 4, then for column 3, place an X next to Candidate 1.

Then for Third Elective office, ditto, ditto.

In studying this thoroughly in 2018, & 2019, the following was found: if RCV were to be instituted: (Note, this is strictly from the Voters' position)>> 1. The VOTER is given a thick ballot (thicker than ever before)—- this Voter may just be coming home from a busy day at work. His or her mind is still on the successes & failures of that day. The VOTER has had a hectic drive since he/she has just gotten off the crowded highway to come & vote. The VOTER is tired. The Voter is planning what to have for dinner. Family comes first, not this Voting Thing. The Voter may not have had time to look at more than 2 or 3 candidates for each Open position, prior to the day of the vote. When they pick up the ballot, and are bewildered over the many ranks/columns to fill out. Voter

needs to get out of there and home to his/her kids. The Kids are having problems in math. So VOTER decides to only use columns 1 & 2 for all 5 positions to be filled.

Maybe, another VOTER votes in early AM, stands in line, and the line is not only long but very very slow. You ask, why is it so slow, as you have that important meeting at 9am you may miss. When you are eventually handed a ballot, you are astounded at how thick the Ballot is. Then you note how many Ranked choices you must make. Then you recall the 9am meeting you must make. You determine THE TIME AVAILABLE you have since you have these other pressing obligations>> your job OR children Or Mother in hospital OR ??? What Is the most important job in your life. You vote for 1 candidate and leave. NOTE WHAT HAPPENS NEXT. SEE BELOW.

In this actual scenario, there is the retired person, who has much time on their hands, OR the unemployed worker, OR the widowed/ widower who also has a lot of time available, but has little interest in the actual positions. They go to vote, and place an X in every available column/ candidate regardless of EXPERIENCE.

There is a greater chance of Older voters becoming confused due to:

- a. Respondence Annoyance & Respondent Error. According to Great Book.com, when the list is long, Voters will disregard the Candidates after the first 3 choices.
- b. No matter how clear the instructions are, some people will still get mixed up. Source— Great Book.com.

In the 2009 Mpls elections, people did not place a second choice on the ballot for the following above reasons; and thereby allowing a much weaker Candidate to "sneak" into office. Such was case in Mpls Park District 5, Ward 11 in 2009.

The conclusion here; there is a much greater chance of an unqualified person being elected.

RCV May eventually lead to the elimination of Primaries & thereby moving to "Jungle" elections. (In California, this is now being done—they take the top 2 vote getters and THEY HAVE A RUNOFF GENERAL ELECTION.)

RCV is designed to increase the power of Weaker Candidates. RCV increases the Voters Time by at least ½ hour—- now multiply that by 4000 voters in off-year elections in Minnetonka.

RCV places Voters in a position where they are to make decisions on Candidates they votes are thrown out.

In my earlier scenario describing the situation of a two voters being in a hurry... Both of those ballots would be eliminated because of the rules not being followed. If a ballot has five candidates, each and every voter MUST, not may, MUST vote for all five

candidates for that ballot to be valid and counted. That's true with all the races with Rank Choice Voting, if four candidates, there MUST be four votes, not three, not two, not one. Any ballots not meeting the requirement will be invalid and not counted. This is how many inexperienced and unqualified candidates get elected. I won't name any here.

Note: all statements made above are based on facts, which are available by contacting me.

At the beginning of this presentation, I began by stating "a presentation was made approximately 1 year ago to the League of Woman's Voters of Mtka, Eden Prairie, & Hopkins."

After a very similar Presentation, the LWV voted NO to RCV.

Dear Charter Commission Members,

I strongly urge you to complete your study of Ranked Choice Voting. This voting reform has been proven to make the city council elections process more efficient, more appealing to voters and welcoming to would-be candidates. Don't we want to have more competitive elections, drawing more voters who understand more about how our city works and what the issues are? Isn't that the point of democracy, and one of the cornerstones of civic engagement?

You must recognize that, despite being a successful city in many regards, our local elections process is flawed. Nearly everyone agrees that our single day special elections are problematic - a plurality winner on a single voting day means that someone could win with just a small share of the vote. But opinions are somehow more divided about our primary/general election process. Our low-turnout primary is laughably unrepresentative of our city - any objective person would say that 4% voter turnout is simply undemocratic, and claiming that this is somehow good (i.e. "those are the smart people who know the issues") is either delusional or elitist. This primary also serves to scare away candidates, and our already small pool of potential city council candidates gets smaller when newcomers are required to finance and campaign for 2 voting days. (As a side note, Minnetonka is one of the last sizable cities in the state that still holds odd-year primaries. St. Louis Park ended theirs after the 2017 race and Bloomington is putting RCV on the November 2020 ballot in an effort to end theirs. Being the last city to stop a bad process isn't the kind of "exceptionalism" that Minnetonka should be known for.) Ranked Choice Voting is an elegant solution to both of these issues: our single day special elections would yield a consensus winner, and we could eliminate this ridiculous primary to save our city money and increase the number of candidates and voters for a November election.

Ranked Choice Voting will save our city money. It is a fully legal and constitutional form of voting. It is an intuitive way of voting that is not hard for people. It does not harm poor communities of people of color. Voters overwhelming like it. These are not my claims, they were shared by Professor Schultz, the expert you asked to testify in January, and are backed up by a wealth of research. Please disregard the claims of people who oppose this issue by incorrectly claiming otherwise.

Please complete your study of this issue and let the voters make the final decision in November 2020. Thank you for your service to our city, both as charter commission members and for your many other previous roles and contributions.

Who would have guessed that Commission Member Karen Anderson was foreshadowing this historic moment when she joined you remotely for your first Ranked Choice Voting study session (and last meeting) on January 28!

Your work on the study sessions about Ranked Choice Voting for Minnetonka municipal elections is critical for impartially presenting the facts for residents, city council members and city staff. We are all in a learning process together, with your wise lead.

These are some questions I hope you will address in the upcoming study sessions:

August Primary Elections

- What is the average percent of voter turnout over the past 5 city primaries?
- What is the estimated cost to taxpayers for a primary election? Estimated total staff hours?
- Polling past candidates for office (winners & losers): Did our current 5 month election process, with a potential of 2 election days, weigh heavily in your decision to run for office? Would you have preferred to file in late summer and have one Election Day in November using Ranked Choice Voting winning by 50% + 1 of the voters?

The Use of Special Election vs Appointment for a Vacated Seat on the City Council

• Compile a list of all City Council members over the last 10 years:

Who was appointed? Who was elected in a special election? Who was elected in a November municipal election?

(Some current & past members might fit more than one category.)

- Is the appointment process used more frequently than a special election? Does this fit our value/goal of a citizen elected council?
- Does Ranked Choice Voting for special elections ensure that the winner has 50% + 1 support of participating Minnetonka voters?

I'm looking forward to answers to these questions and all of yours, as well.

I hope you will reschedule the postponed March 17 agenda. Your list of election specialists will provide all of us with valuable information.

Ranked Choice Voting for Minnetonka should be decided by the voters on this November 2020 ballot. Please work toward this goal.

Dear Respected Minnetonka Charter Commission,

I am writing this letter to you on Memorial Day, which is very fitting. We are a nation that has always changed and evolved to right a wrong, and to improve the situation for its citizens, as the need arises. That need is here, now, in Minnetonka. I sincerely hope you will do your jobs, complete the study of Ranked Choice Voting, and recommend to the City Council to approve its adoption in Minnetonka.

What is the problem that needs to be addressed in Minnetonka? The voting system in Minnetonka is broken and unfair. The problem is that many, many Minnetonka residents don't run for representative positions because they know they can't win. They know that they are outside the power hierarchy in Minnetonka. They know this because:

- The Minnetonka City Council has been 100% white, and predominantly white males, for decades. This does not represent the entire citizenry of Minnetonka. It does represent the power structure.
 - a. Councilwoman Kissy Coakley's success in winning the District 4 seat in 2019 is a welcome change. But how many white candidates running in Minnetonka had to give up their jobs, as Kissy did, so they could campaign door to door for 7 months ahead of the election?
 - b. In contrast, her white male opponent barely campaigned, and relied on the ads containing Mayor Brad Weirsum's and other past mayors' and councilmen's endorsements. This happened after Mayor Weirsum told Kissy he would not be endorsing any candidates in the campaign. I live in District 4 and saw these campaigns in action.
 - c. This is a good representation of the power structure in action.
- 2. Many City Council members over decades have been appointed by the Council to fill open Council seats instead of holding elections. When it's time for the next election, the appointed Councilmembers have a big advantage over anyone else who wants to run for that seat. Usually the appointed person wins the election. In this way, the power structure in Minnetonka continues its stronghold.

There is a broken and unfair system in Minnetonka for the election of the City Council.

How will adopting Ranked Choice Voting help to evolve this into a better situation for the people of Minnetonka?

- 1. Ranked Choice Voting eliminates the need for Minnetonka's traditional August primaries.
 - a. This saves an estimated \$20,000 per primary in which we typically have about 4% of the voters voting.
 - b. This means that 96% of the voters won't have the 4% selecting the candidates for the final election.

- c. This means that 100% of the Minnetonka voters will have the full slate of candidates to choose from.
- 2. More people will run for office, because with Ranked Choice Voting, they will be able to make it to the final ballot on Election Day, and not be eliminated in the primary.

Isn't this what it's all about: Representative government?

I believe in representative government in which the representatives actually reflect the many and beautiful diversities of the people.

This is why we need Ranked Choice Voting in Minnetonka. So that our City Council reflects who we are as a citizenry, so the beliefs, needs, and opportunities of all our people will be addressed.

Thank you for voting to recommend approval of Ranked Choice Voting to the City Council.

The first preferences of each voter are counted. If any candidate receives a majority (50% +1) of the first preferences, they win. If no candidate reaches a majority, then the candidate with the fewest first preferences is eliminated. The voters who preferred the eliminated candidate then have their vote moved to their 2nd preference. The ballots are counted again, if a candidate has a majority, they are the winner. "The first preferences of each voter are counted. If any candidate receives a majority (50% +1) of the first preferences, they win. If no candidate reaches a majority, then the candidate with the fewest first preferences is eliminated. The voters who preferred the eliminated candidate then have their vote moved to their 2nd preference. The ballots are counted again, if a candidate has a majority, they are the winner. How the Definition of "Majority" Changes What's Not Being Said

- In the very first round the candidate receiving >50% has earned a true majority of all votes.
- When RCV proponents talk about subsequent rounds (those that occur when no candidate has received >50%) they continue to use the term "majority" although it now means something different.
- Ballots can become exhausted and a percentage of votes do not count toward the final decision.
- "Majority" now means the <u>majority of surviving votes</u>; the majority of the votes that did not become exhausted.
- The continued use of "majority" without this explanation is misleading.

Ballot Exhaustion

- Ballot Exhaustion: Occurs when rankings on a voter's ballot prevent their vote from being counted and determining the election's end result.
- A ballot becomes exhausted when a voter:
 - ✓ Overvotes (ex: Voter accidentally ranks two candidates as their first choice.)
 - ✓ Exhausts their choices This is inherent in RCV. A voter can list their preferences such that when applied to a runoff round it is for candidate who is already eliminated. The vote is taken out of the election.
 - ✓ <u>Undervotes</u> (ex: Voter ranks only one candidate on their ballot and that candidate is eventually eliminated from the contest before the final round.)
- In plain speak: It's as if these voters never showed up on Election Day.
- The topic of ballot exhaustion appears <u>not</u> to have been discussed other than once in passing by the Council, Commission or FairVote. The term "ballot exhaustion" never shows up on rcvminnetonka.org's website.
- Ballot exhaustion is extremely important to understand (and to explain to voters) as it is an integral part of RCV's mechanics.

Undervoting

Potential Punishment of Loyalists, Seniors, Busy Citizens

"Instead of just picking one candidate per race, voters are allowed (but not required) to make a 1st/2nd/3rd choice."

While true, not ranking all candidates brings the risk of ballot exhaustion.

Who undervotes?

- Party Loyalists who will only rank those of their political party.
- <u>Seniors</u> (who vote in higher proportions) and traditionalists who have always voted for one candidate.
- Busy citizens who only rank the candidates they have researched.

If these voters only choose one candidate (or a limited number) on their ballot, it is more likely to become exhausted, giving those who fully complete their ballot more influence over the electoral process.

Proponents' Unbalanced Position on Ballot Exhaustion and Undervoting

"There's no such thing as a vote that doesn't matter." Barack Obama

"...in a city council race the rate of exhausted ballots is 10%...voters who do not fully rank their ballot...If that is the voter's preference, it is perfectly fine. We encourage voters to understand the implications." (paraphrased)

"...an "exhausted" ballot does not equal a disenfranchised voter. It simply means that a voter didn't have a preference for any more candidates on the ballot after selecting their first or second preferences."

- Why shouldn't we consider that just as valid?
- There are two sets of implications to be considered.

Ballot Exhaustion and Undervoting RCV's Created Dilemma

What proponents are really saying:

"Voters, here's your choice: You can partially fill out your ballot, risk that it becomes exhausted and does not go to deciding the final outcome OR you can completely fill out the ballot and risk that your vote supports a candidate that you would not vote for otherwise."

This is a Cornelian dilemma: A dilemma where a person must choose between two courses of action that either of which will have a harmful effect on themselves or others.

How is this fair to people who have expressed a just as valid set of preferences?

Does this fit with the presented benefit of inclusiveness?



"On average, approximately 11% of ballots become exhausted."

"The eventual winner wins with a fake majority 61% of the time."

Maine's 2018 Second Congressional race (incumbent Poliquin; challengers Golden, Bond and Hoar) 289,624 votes were cast in the first round. Golden was declared the winner in the 2nd round of tabulation with 142,440 votes, 49.18% of ballots cast in the election. More than 8,000 ballots were exhausted... allowing the eventual winner to take the contest with less than a true majority of the votes cast.

2010 race for San Francisco Board of Supervisors (City Council): After 20 rounds of tabulation, there were 9,608 exhausted ballots, whereas the winner garnered only 4,321 votes. **The victor took fewer than 25% of the votes.**

Ranked choice ballots have suppressed voter turnout, especially among those segments of the electorate that are already least likely to participate. RCV has resulted in decreased turnouts up to 8% in non-presidential elections. Low-propensity voters are already less likely to participate in elections that do not coincide with congressional or presidential races. ... Moreover, RCV exacerbates economic and racial disparities in voting. Voting errors and spoiled ballots occur far more often.

Primaries – Turnout

Common Sense Question: Why not direct our resources to address our current system that we already know and understand? (Instead of adopting one that we do not?)

- Proponents have a long list of benefits, promises and guarantees.
- Everyone can find info to support or debunk, argue for or against.
- Everyone would agree with the proponents goals but not necessarily the RCV system when they understand it in its entirety.
- We need to truly understand how it works.
- There are also other issues like rigging that require study.

Suggestions to Consider

- Fix what we currently have to increase primary turnout. It is more prudent.
- Quantify the RCV promises and guarantees.
- Incorporate these numbers as continuous requirements for RCV to fulfill in the city charter.
- If RCV fails to live up to requirements, then have a repeal mechanism built into the city's charter.

"Had the 96 elections we analyzed been decided by a plurality of the votes, 87 percent of the outcomes would remain the same: The end result of elections decided by ranked-choice voting closely mirrors the outcome that would be produced under traditional voting systems, begging the question of whether ranked-choice voting is worth the hassle it creates for voters and state government.
