Minnetonka to vote on ranked choice voting

The Minnetonka City Council voted to include ranked choice voting on the November 2020 election ballot. Now, voters will decide whether Minnetonka will use ranked choice voting for city elections (mayor and city council).

🖌 lf you vote yes

A yes vote means you are in favor of:

- Using ranked choice voting to elect the mayor and council members if three or more candidates run for a particular seat, beginning in November 2021.
- The elimination of primary elections for mayor and city council elections.

🖌 lf you vote no

A no vote means you are in favor of:

- Minnetonka continuing to use the current election system, which asks voters to vote for one candidate per office.
- The continuing use of primary elections whenever more than two candidates run for mayor or a particular city council seat.

What is ranked choice voting?

- Ranked choice voting (RCV) is a voting system that eliminates the need for a primary election because voters are asked to rank candidates in order of preference - first choice, second choice and third choice, etc.
- The first round of voting is tallied using first-preference votes only. If a candidate wins a majority of the firstpreference votes in the first round, that candidate is the winner.
- If no candidate wins a majority of first-preference votes, the candidate with the fewest first-preference votes is eliminated, and all first-preference votes for the eliminated candidate are also eliminated. Voting then proceeds to a second round.
- The process is repeated until one candidate has won a majority of all unexhausted* ballots. Ballots may be counted in one or more rounds.

*What is an exhausted ballot?

Ballot exhaustion occurs when all the candidates marked on the ballot have been eliminated in prior rounds. For example, a voter might rank only three out of six candidates. If all the voter's choices are eliminated in the first three rounds of tabulating votes, the voter's ballot is exhausted and won't factor into subsequent rounds.

The winning candidate is determined by the majority of ballots that have not been exhausted.

City council adopts Energy Action Plan

The Minnetonka City Council adopted an Energy Action Plan, pending 2021 budget approval, earlier this summer. The plan was developed by a team of residents, businesses, students, non-profits and community groups, with support from city staff and Xcel Energy.

The plan identifies energy reduction goals that are expected to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 41 percent by 2030, which is equivalent to removing 35,000 vehicles from the road for one year.

Strategies to meet these goals include energy reduction for multi-family buildings and residential properties, expanding renewable energy, business outreach and accommodating electric vehicles.

Ask a city planner

In each issue of the Minnetonka Memo, our planners answer a common question to help residents and businesses learn more about the planning process and available city resources.

Question:

Can I display a campaign sign on my property?



Answer:

During the 2020 election, temporary signs may be displayed beginning 46 days prior to the Aug. 11 primary election, and must be removed by Nov. 13 (10 days after Election Day).

Temporary signs of any size and number are allowed during the general election as long as they are not:

- On public property.
- Attached to trees, utility poles or fences, or placed on roofs.
- Within five feet of a public street.
- Obstructing visibility at intersections.
- Placed without the property owner's consent.

Absentee voting begins Sept. 18

Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 3, and voters can begin casting absentee ballots Friday, Sept. 18. Due to the lingering COVID-19 pandemic, it's our goal that every eligible Minnetonka voter can cast their ballot safely and securely.

Here's how you can vote absentee:

- By mail learn how at minnetonkamn.gov/election
 - Ballots must be received by Election Day to count.
 - Please consider mailing from the post office or a blue postal service box to ensure your ballot is mailed securely.
- In-person at Minnetonka City Hall beginning Sept. 18
 - Sept. 18-Nov. 2, Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m.

COVID-19 precautions

Election staff will follow CDC guidelines, wear personal protective equipment and disinfect surfaces regularly. Please wear a mask and practice social distancing. We'll have masks available, and will provide hand sanitizer and pens for each voter to use and keep.

Fall leaf drop-off site opens Sept. 19

Each fall, the city accepts leaves, yard waste and brush from Minnetonka residents at the Public Works Facility at 11522 Minnetonka Blvd. Residents must present a driver's license, state ID or Minnetonka utility bill. Commercial tree and lawn services must prove materials came from a Minnetonka address.

Keep leaves and yard waste separate from brush and drop off in their respective areas. Bags cannot be left at the drop-off site, including compostable bags.

This fall, think about spring

Fall yard work is crucial in Minnesota to protect your plants against the elements of winter and prepare them to thrive the following spring.

As you embark on your outdoor fall chores, follow these tips to remedy small problems or begin changes that will bear fruit in the future.

- Seed (or overseed) bare spots in your lawn. Try fescue grasses in shady or damp spots where conventional grass hasn't thrived.
- Pull weeds when the ground is moist ideally, after it rains. Place weeds in plastic bags and deposit in the trash.



- If you need to use herbicide, spot-spray problem areas rather than applying broadly. Don't do it when it's windy or rainy to avoid the spread of chemicals.
- You can plant trees, shrubs and perennials in the fall if they are properly mulched and receive an inch of water per week until the ground freezes. Add wire caging around woody plants to protect from wildlife.
- Collect native plant seeds and distribute them over the soil.
- Spread a thin layer of leaf litter atop planting beds for protection, shelter and nutrients.
- Rather than clearing perennials, cut them to 8-12 inches high. Bees can spend the winter inside the dried stems.


Don't feed the deer

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources enacted a deer feeding and attractant ban in Hennepin County earlier this summer. The order also includes regulations for feeding birds and small animals.

The goal of the ban is to prevent disease spread

among the deer population, especially Chronic Wasting Disease. Please follow the ban to keep our wildlife happy and healthy!
