## Vote absentee in October

Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 3, and voters can cast absentee ballots throughout October. Due to the lingering COVID-19 pandemic, it's our goal that every eligible Minnetonka voter can cast their ballot safely and securely.

Here's how you can vote absentee:

- In-person at the Minnetonka Council Chambers
  - Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.-4:30 p.m.
  - Park and enter at the community center (14600 Minnetonka Blvd.)
- By mail learn how at minnetonkamn.gov/election
  - Ballots must be postmarked by Election Day and received by Nov. 10 to count.
  - Completed ballots can be dropped off at the community center (lower level) during in-person absentee voting. Visit our website for details. We do not plan to have a drop box.
  - Please consider mailing from the post office or a blue postal service box.

#### **COVID-19** precautions

- Please wear a mask and practice social distancing.
- We'll have masks, hand sanitizer and pens for each voter.
- Election staff will follow CDC guidelines, wear personal protective equipment and disinfect surfaces regularly.

### Minnetonka to vote on ranked choice voting

On the November 2020 election ballot, Minnetonka voters will be asked to consider adopting ranked choice voting for city elections (mayor and city council).

The city does not endorse a "yes" or "no" vote on this issue. Voters are encouraged to educate themselves on ranked choice voting and make their own decisions. Any communications that advocate a "yes" or "no" vote are not from the city.

#### If you vote no, you're in favor of:

- Minnetonka continuing to use the current election system, which asks voters to vote for one candidate per office.
- The continuing use of primary elections whenever more than two candidates run for mayor or a particular city council seat.

#### **V** If you vote yes, you're in favor of:

- Using ranked choice voting to elect the mayor and city council members, beginning in November 2021.
- The elimination of primary elections for mayor and city council elections.

## City council sets limit for 2021 property tax levy

Each September, the city council is required to set a maximum preliminary tax levy before approving the following year's budget. This year, the council set the 2021 preliminary tax levy at its Sept. 21 meeting, which occurred after the Minnetonka Memo went to print. The council will continue to review and discuss 2021 city property taxes and finances prior to final adoption of the levy in December.

Property owners will receive proposed 2021 tax notices from Hennepin County in November.

### Don't 'waste' yard waste this fall

Leaves, twigs and grass clippings are often called "yard waste," but these beneficial items can add nutrients to the soil and increase water absorption. This fall, follow these tips to get the most out of your yard waste.

- Compost leaves, grass and native plant trimmings as mulch.
- Mow grass clippings and leaves back onto the lawn.
- Bag yard waste for curbside collection or bring it to the city's leaf and brush drop-off site (see page 4 for details).
- Visit **adopt-a-drain.org** to adopt a storm sewer drain. Clean it regularly to prevent water pollution.

## **Apply for a deconstruction grant**

To promote this unique form of recycling, Hennepin County is offering grants to help offset deconstruction's additional time and labor costs.

Homeowners and developers can apply to receive grants up to \$5,000. Projects must be 250 square feet or larger on structures built prior to 1950 and must meet additional criteria.
