**SUBJECT:** Update regarding ranked choice voting.

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This memo provides an update on the use of ranked choice voting in Minnetonka, since the date of the charter commission's last meeting in November 2020.

As the commission is aware, on Nov. 3, 2020, Minnetonka voters approved an amendment to the city charter, adopting ranked choice voting (RCV) for municipal elections. The charter amendment required that the city council "provide by ordinance the ballot format and the rules for counting the votes and breaking a tie." An ordinance, similar in content to those adopted in Minneapolis and St. Louis Park, was introduced at the city council meeting on Feb. 22, 2021 and adopted at the March 8, 2021 regular city council meeting. The ordinance allows voters to rank up to three candidates for each municipal office.

Following the adoption of the ordinance, the city's elections staff began the process of implementation. This included hiring a deputy city clerk, collaborating with the communications division on an education campaign and creating a roadmap to adjust all internal documentation and procedures to align with the use of RCV.

City staff utilized all forms of communication in its education and outreach efforts in order to reach the widest possible audience. The on-line efforts included the creation of videos and social media notifications. City staff also used traditional means of reaching voters, including information in the *Minnetonka Memo*, informational mailers that went to all Minnetonka households, as well as in-person presentations. City staff gave presentations at the senior center and in various co-ops and senior living facilities and also staffed booths at all July farmer's markets and the October open house. The staff conducted two very successful outdoor mock elections. The deputy city clerk, under the direction of the city clerk, spearheaded the educational campaign, which is outlined in the attached memo.

The elections specialist led the city's work to establish internal procedures and training. These efforts were focused on navigating the post tabulation process, providing an in-person designated RCV training session to all election judges, and updating forms and documentation to reflect the change in voting process.

The elections staff also partnered with other communities that use ranked choice voting by participating in a monthly workgroup meeting. The group consisted of representatives from Minnetonka Minneapolis, St. Louis Park, Bloomington, Hennepin County, Ramsey County and the Minnesota Secretary of State's office. This collaboration allowed Minnetonka staff to learn

from our surrounding communities and share resources as we entered our first election with RCV.

The municipal general election was held on Tuesday, Nov. 2, 2021 for the offices of Mayor, Council Member At Large Seat A and Council Member At Large Seat B. Absentee voting for this election began on Sept. 18, 2021. Two candidates competed for the mayoral seat, and five candidates each filed for the two at-large council seats. It seems likely that the use of ranked choice voting influenced the number of candidates competing for office. Brad Wiersum (Mayor) and Deb Calvert (At Large Seat A) both won a majority (50%+1) of first choice votes at the first round of tabulation. Kimberly Wilburn (At Large Seat B) won a majority (50% +1) of votes after four rounds of tabulation.

There was an increase of voter turnout both in absentee voters and on Election Day. A total of 11,350 persons voted in the municipal election --2,795 during absentee voting and 8,555 on Election Day, resulting in a 28.5% voter turnout. This is the highest voter turnout the city has seen for a municipal election. The municipal election was conducted in conjunction with school district elections, and voter turnout for the three school district elections was similarly high. At this time, it is not possible to determine the extent to which ranked choice voting affected voter turnout; additional elections will need to occur in order to identify trends in voting.

Elections results were canvassed by resolution at the Nov. 8, 2021 regular city council meeting. The council also set the date, time and place for the post-election review that is required by City Code section 107.070. The post-election review will be held on Nov. 10, 2021 at 9 a.m. in the Minnetonka Council Chambers and is open to the public. Election judges will hand count the ballots from two precincts, for only the mayor's office, in order to verify the accuracy of the voting systems and tabulation.

Minnetonka elections staff plans to conduct a survey of the community to learn about the voter experience during this last election. At a study session in 2022, staff will present to the city council the survey results, a report on the education, outreach and election costs, and a forecast of expected future costs, based upon the city's successful completion of its first ranked choice voting election.

*“Threshold” means the number of votes sufficient for a candidate to be elected. In any given election, the threshold equals the total votes counted in the first round, after removing partially defective ballots, divided by the sum of one (1) plus the number of offices to be filled, then adding one (1).*

*Round by round summary:*

1. *Kimberly Wilburn received the most first preference votes (4139), but did not meet the threshold (5096) to be declared the winner.*
2. *The lowest votes including undeclared write-ins (UWI) and the candidate with the lowest first choice preferences (Daniel Kral) was eliminated. Those votes are reallocated to the voters second choice preference.*
3. *Kimberly Wilburn continued with the highest vote total (4258), but did not meet the threshold (5096) to be declared the winner. Jim Hadley received the highest number of reallocated votes (327) in this round. Ash Patel is eliminated in this round.*
4. *Kimberly Wilburn continued with the highest vote total (4916), but did not meet the threshold (5096) to be declared the winner. Kimberly Wilburn received the highest number of reallocated votes (658) in this round. Jim Hadley is eliminated in this round.*
5. *Kimberly Wilburn continued with the highest vote total (5205), which is above the threshold (5096). **Kimberly Wilburn was declared the winner in the fourth round.***
