2021 Election Results

Minnetonka voters elected a new member of the city council during the 2021 municipal election. Kimberly Wilburn won a majority after four rounds of tabulation using the Ranked Choice Voting system. Mayor Brad Wiersum and Councilmember Deb Calvert were both re-elected having won a majority of first choice preferences.

Mayor

Brad Wiersum 6,897 votes for 60.77%.

At-Large Councilmember, Seat A

Deb Calvert 5,881 votes for 51.81%.

At-Large Councilmember, Seat B

Kimberly Wilburn 5,205 votes for 51.08%



The mayor and both at-large councilmembers will begin serving four-year terms in January. This is the first year Minnetonka used a Ranked Choice Voting system where voters are asked to rank candidates in order of preference – first choice, second choice and third choice. 2022 budget summary and public hearing

In September, the city council adopted a preliminary property tax increase of no more than 5.6 percent for 2022.

The council will vote on adoption of the final 2022 budget and levy at its Dec. 6 meeting.

What does this mean for the average homeowner?

City property taxes for the median-valued home in Minnetonka (\$405,400 for taxes payable in 2022) will increase by approximately \$97.

What's new in 2021?



The 2022 budget focuses on public safety. 2.2 percent of the 5.6 percent levy increase is directed towards hiring nine full-time firefighters to supplement our existing paid-on-call staffing. "Increasing our full-time staffing will allow us to remain proactive and reduce response time of fire crews first arriving on the scene," said Fire Chief John Vance.

Another focus of the 2022 budget is reinstating a portion of the levy dedicated to capital projects and equipment purchases that were suspended in 2021 in a direct effort to lessen the financial burden on taxpayers given the uncertainty of the pandemic. The reinstatement of the capital portion of the levy equates to 2.3 percent.



2022 City Budget Overview


Here's how we're funded

Projected 2022 Revenue




Here's how it's spent

Save energy and stay comfortable

Schedule an energy audit to save energy and money while making your home more comfortable. The Home Energy Squad provides expert advice to homeowners, whether your goal is to lower utility bills or plan larger home improvement projects. The **city will pay half of the \$100 fee** for Minnetonka residents who sign up for a visit by the end of the year.



Energy Improvements in Minnetonka:

Marilyn, a Minnetonka homeowner, was hoping to make her 1980s home less drafty. After requesting a bid for window replacement, she realized the project was above her budget. She then scheduled a Home Energy Squad visit to find out where her home was losing the most heat. The auditors recommended adding additional attic insulation to cost-effectively improve comfort throughout the home. After completing the insulation work, she earned a rebate from CenterPoint Energy. "The result was a warmer home last winter, and some great advice" said Marilyn.

Home visits include:

- Products such as LED lightbulbs, weather stripping and a programmable or smart thermostat installed during the visit so you can save energy right away
- Inspection of your insulation, heating equipment and water heater
- A customized report with recommendations of low-cost solutions as well as larger energy efficiency projects
- Free support after the visit to find qualified contractors and earn rebates

Natural Resources volunteers make a world of difference!

Volunteers contribute hundreds of hours and lots of good-hearted energy to Minnetonka's natural resources programs every year.

2021 project highlights include:

- Forestry volunteers planted 28 young trees of 14 species in Covington Park, increasing diversity and resilience in Minnetonka's community forest.
- Friends of Minnetonka Parks recruited residents and scheduled restoration efforts, such as buckthorn removal, at Big Willow, Hilloway, Lone Lake, Meadow, Purgatory and Victoria-Evergreen parks.

- Geocachers have done invasive species removal in Minnetonka parks since 2014.
- Girl Scout Troop 16537 of Hopkins and Plymouth maintained plant cages, dug up garlic mustard and motherwort, and cut prickly ash in spring.
- Mountain Bike Trail Advocates showed up every month to assist with prairie maintenance and whatever other work was most pressing at Lone Lake Park.
- Minnesota Master Naturalists collected native wildflower and grass seeds for National Public Lands Day, then weeded and planted seeds in new park locations. Since 2013, they have also adopted a portion of Minnetonka Mills Park for ongoing maintenance.

Practice holiday-season fire safety

In addition to festive gatherings and decorations, the holiday season also brings increased fire risk. Follow these tips to ensure a fun and safe holiday season!



DECORATIONS

Choose flame-resistant materials. Keep away from lit candles, fireplaces, stoves, windows and doors.



LIGHTS



Hang with clips instead of nails. Ensure indoor- and outdoor-only lights are used in the proper setting. Replace lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Turn off lights before leaving or going to bed.

ENTERTAINING

Ensure all smoke alarms are working properly. Tell guests about your home's fire escape plan. Never leave the kitchen while cooking; if you have to step away, turn off the stove and remove pans from burners.
